The butchers were present in considerable numbers, but seemed inclined to curtail their purchases owing to the muggy weather, and the market was unusually dull, with prices still tending downward. A few of the best beeves were sold at about 34c per lb, but there were not many sales made at above 3tc per lb, at which rate Mr. Bickerdike bought 19 pretty good steers averaging a little over 1,100 lbs each. Common dry cows and half-fitted young stock sold at from 2tc to 3c, and the leaner beasts at about 2c per lb. It is probable that a considerable number will have to be held over for another market. Calves sell at about former figures. Mr. Bourassa bought nine good calves at from \$2 to \$5 each. Mutton critters are dull of sale at about for-mer rates, good shipting sheep being up to 31c per lb; the others sell at from 3c to 3ic per lb. Good lots of lambs sell at about \$3 each with a few choice ones at about \$3 50 each. Common lambs sell at about \$250 each, and the culls at from \$150 to \$2 each. Fat hogs are not plentiful and prices are higher, or from 51c to 51c

THE CHEESE SITUATION.

Cheese keeps a pretty steady market, but supplies are beginning somewhat to outpace demand, and hoiders are not unwilling to drop a point here and there to trade. Nevertheless the transactions passing are on a healthy basis, c. i. f. and spot rates being near akin. People do not eat a lot of cheese—or, for that matter, anything else—in such hot weather as we have now, and as this temporary cause may very soon cease to operate, the market may begin te boom again very soon. Quotations now are 47s finest, 45s to 46s fine, white and colored being equally valued. United States are a point or two below, half meats being almost unsaleable. Some New Zealand is offering at a point or two above Canadian and is getting

in some places. Western country cheese markets were all excited today, prices ruling at a to 3-16c advance on the week. At Brockville 415 white and 871 colored were offered with sales at 9%c white and 197-16c colored, which about clears out nearly all the July make in that section. The Kingston market was strong and excited, with sales of 819 boxes at 93c white, 94c colored. The above prices are higher in proportion to those ruling in this market. The plums are falling into the farmers laps in abundance. Good for the country and general business—at least it should be. — [Montreal Trade Bulletin, Aug. 10.

Sensational Case Unearthed in Elgin County.

The Body of the Late George Sealey, of Vienna, Exhumed-Arsenic in the Stomach.

VIENNA, Ont., Aug. 14. - George Sealey, a retired wealthy farmer, parted some years ago from his wife, giving her \$200 per year to sign off all claims against him. For the last two years Mr. Sealey has had as a housekeeper a Mrs. Robbins. About a year ago Mr. Sealey took sick. gradually growing worse until about a month ago, when he died. The bulk of his property he left to Mrs. Robbins. After his death a good deal of talk arose about the circumstances surrounding it, and some peculiar letters being found, De-

tective Clayton decided to investigate. He soon found evidence which he considered justified him in laying information before Dr. McLay, the county coroner, who at once issued a warrant to have the body of deceased taken up and a postmortem examination held. The examination was held about two weeks ago by Drs. Sinclair and Hoover, and resulted in traces of poison being discovered. Subsequently the stomach, liver and kid-

TAKEN TO LONDON by Detective Clayton and given to Prof. Harrison, the Dominion analyst, to analyze. The inquest was resumed yesterday. Prof. Harrison was present, and swore that he had analyzed the liver, kidney and stomach, and had found three grains of arsenic. The case was given to the jury at 6 p.m., and after being out about an hour they brought in a verdict that Mr. Sealey came to his death by poison administered by some person or persons unknown.
