THE STANDARD WAGE

Shall Contractors for City Work Pay It ?

Mr. Little Says That It Is Right to so Provide.

One of the matters before the electors in this municipal campaign has been the question of whether or not the mayor and aldermen should stipulate in contracts with those doing city work that the employers shall pay their men the standard wages

ruling in their respective callings. Mr. Little, the People's Candidate for the Mayoralty, was the first nominee to pronounce upon the question, and he promptly informed the electors that he regarded it as an eminently fair principle that the City Council, representing the whole of the citizens, should enact that in all contracts for city work the contractors should pay the standard wage ruling in the respective trades. When elected Mayor, as there seems to be no doubt that he will be on Monday next, Mr. Little will

see that the Council so decrees. The carrying out of a regulation of this kind will ensure fair play all round. The taxpayers will get a good job. The contractors will stand on an equal footing in building, and the workman will get living

wages. These are principles which Mr. Little has carried out in his dealings with the workers at all times. In his own business, he pays his hands the highest ruling wages. He gives them a Saturday half-holiday. When they are sick their pay goes on all the time. These facts Mr. Little modestly admitted at a recent meeting, but he omitted to divulge another secret into which not many more than the employes of his firm have been let in: Again and again, his firm has made its employes a Christmas box of a month's salary. Such employers

London may well be proud of. Then who ever knew of a man working for Mr. Little who did not desire to work for him again? It is no new born zeal resulting from his candidature for the mayoralty that makes Mr. Little a friend of the workers, ready to see that they get fair play in regard to wages when employes of the city, but also in the proper use of their taxes in improving and building up the city.
