SAAC DOWNIE NOT GUILTY

Was Charged With Ricting and Stone Throwing on July 8-W. H. Tarling Pleads Guilty.

At the sessions of the peace yesterday afternoon Isaac Downie pleaded not guilty to rioting and stone-throwing on July 8 last. The jury after being out about 25 minutes returned a verdict of not guilty. Judge Elliott charged strongly against the defendant in his address to the jurors.

P. C. McDonald, sworn, said he was on duty on the day of the trouble at the corner of Dundas and Lyle streets. He said the defendant was in the crowd between 6 and 7 o'clock, and deliberately threw a missile through a car window. He heard the defendant say nothing, and could not get near enough to him to ask him his name that night. He learned it later on inquiry at the Globe casket works, where the de-fendant is employed. Cross-examined by Mr. Buchner, witness stated that Downie gave him his name freely when he asked for it. He (McDonald) did not report the case for several days after the occurrence.

P. C. Woolway, who also was on duty at the scene of the trouble, said he saw the defendant throw three missiles at the cars, which were being taken to the barns. Witness was only about fifteen feet from the defendant at the time the stones were thrown, and had not the slightest doubt that Downie was the man. The stone-throwing occurred between 6:30 and 7

James Johnston, the first witness for the defense, had to be carried into the court room on a stretcher, having been injured in a street railway accident at the corner of Central avenue and Adelaide street several months ago. He was in the crowd near the car barns. and saw the defendant Downie on the south side of Dundas street, near Lyle. Downie said to him: "It's a pity to see this stone-throwing. They might kill somebody." This was about eighteen minutes past 6, and the defendant did not leave him until shortly after 7 o'clock. He was positive that Downie threw no stones during that time.

Wesley McBride, foreman in the finishing department of the Globe casket works, saw Downie standing at the corner of Lyle and Dundas streets, talking to an elderly gentleman, whom he did not know. This was about 6:35. He saw the defendant throw no stones while he was there.

Leonard Harvey met the defendant at the corner of Elizabeth street on the night in question, at about 6:40. He stood and chatted with him until his (Harvey's) wife came up and said: "When are you coming home to sup-per? It is 7 o'clock." Witness then left for home with his wife, and the defendant accompanied them up Elizabeth street as far as Lorne avenue. He would swear positively that Downie threw no stones while in his company.

The defendant, Isaac Downie, sworn, said he worked on the afternoon of the riots until 6 o'clock. He left the casket works shortly after 6 o'clock, and went in an easterly direction. On arriving at the corner of Lyle and Dundas streets he met Mr. Johnston, and stopped talking to him about half an hour. He left Mr. Johnston to go over and talk to Mr. Harvey. Witness' story from that time corroborated the story told by Another game of the city league Harvey. 31 for sentence.
