New York, Aug. 6.—There were elements of demoralization in the first 15 minutes of trading this morning, and it is not too much to assert that the suspension of any important house would have produced panic conditions rather than have helped the market. Long stocks came out, pressure was marked, and liquidation of hypothetical securities helped to intensify fears into traders' hearts. The fact that all clearing house sheets went through liquidation, and the market stalled, though covering was a favoring factor, but stocks generally were well taken during the second hour. Stocks could be sold at any time. The opening was irregular, then came a severe drive that carried prices down. The Gold stocks were under pressure, and Missouri Pacific broke so sharply that it excited rumors of a concerted attack. The list began to rally after the early drives, held its own for a time, and did better. Support is appearing in a number of the stocks, and the market may be a crucial period. The air is not yet clear. Sales to noon, \$66,000 shares.

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JUDGES OF THE GARDEN

COMPETITIONS AT WORK

They Have Made Two Inspections and Have Prepared Part Report of Results.

What might be called an interim report of the garden competition has been prepared by the judges, who report that this summer a great improvement is shown in the way in which gardens about the city are kept. Two inspections have been made, one in June and one in July, and the results show that at present the competitors stand in the following order: Class I, front lawns and surroundings—William Moore, 19 Oxford street; Miss Burgess, 7 Bruce street; T. The judges state that there is a marked improvement this year, and that the results of the prize competition, as shown so far, are very substantial.
