He was followed by Archdeacon Brough and Archdeacon Marsh, after whom came the present incumbent. Old St. John's Church was raised in 1823, but not completed till some years after. In 1835 St. Paul's was built, and shortly after St. George's, in the Robson settlement. The ground originally occupied by St. John's as a parish has now six independent churches, with between 200 and 300 families attached to them.
