CHICAGO CATTLEMEN WERE IN UGLY MOOD

Dwindling Orders Left Them With Many Cattle on Their Hands

Chicago, May 1. — When the pretense of cattle buying ended at the stock yards yesterday 10,000 cattle remained in the pens unsold. In 20 years such a number has not been left over. The buyers of the packers told the commission men and shippers that until the people commenced again to eat meat they would purchase only the cattle necessary to fill the dwindling butcher orders. No animals, they said, would be put into the coolers. The bottom instantly dropped out of the cattle market, and the hog and sheep markets tumbled in sympathy. The price of cattle fell from 15 to 25 cents on the hundredweight; that of hogs 10 and 15 cents, and that of sheep about 10 cents. At these reduced prices the packers divided about \$900,000 among themselves. Having supplied their immediate needs they refused to bid further and left the pens.

The angry shippers charged that they were the victims of a conspiracy. They declared that the packers had deliberately trapped them into shipping by offering high prices, and that having got the live stock within reach they had purposely plotted to break the market. The cattle left over will go "stale" in trade parlance, and under the best conditions will sell much lower than the market price.

Absolute proof of the existence of at least three agreements between the packing concerns included in the beef trust was obtained by United States District Attorney Betha. Backed by documentary proofs the evidence will be among the strongest yet produced, and the hardest for the attorneys of the meat companies to combat. The facts entered into are referred to as "cartage," "credit," and "railroad," the last of which is said to be in violation of the interstate commerce laws. Copies of these agreements are in the hands of the government representative, and will be used in its case to show the methods of the combine. Former employees of the various packing companies have already given Attorney Betha evidence, and will be on hand if called upon to give testimony regarding these agreements.

Anonymous letter writers have entered the fight against the trust. They are threatening dire vengeance upon the heads of large packing concerns,

because of the advance in the prices of meat. Some of the letters stated that the writers would blow up the packing houses. Other letter writers have made milder threats. "Beware the fate of McKinley" is one favorite phrase used by the authors of the letters.

MANITOBA'S REFERENDUM. Winnipeg, May 1.—The official figures of the total vote on the referendum are 38,006. Of these 15,647 voted "Yes" and 22,359 voted "No," making a majority of 6,712 against the liquor act. The total number of persons entitled to vote on the referendum, as closely as can be estimated, was 70,902.

RUN DOWN BY A FAST TRAIN

Four Occupants of a Carriage Were Killed.

Insane Woman Poisons Her Two Young Children and Herself—All Three Dead—Other Casualties.

RUN DOWN BY A TRAIN.

Kewanee, Ill., May 2.—Four lives were lost here early yesterday morning in an accident at the Main street crossing of the Burlington Railroad. The Burlington fast mail train, east-bound, which runs through Kewanee without stopping, ran down a carriage containing four young people, and all were instantly killed. They were: Miss Maggie Kessler, Kewanee; Miss Blanche Harding, Kewanee; C. A. Butters, Galva; E. E. Ensmey, Galva. The bodies of all were terribly mangled.

THREE DIED OF POISONING.

Denver, Col., May 2.—Mrs. John L. Kingsley, wife of the foreman of a local laundry, poisoned her two children, aged eight and twelve years respectively, and herself this afternoon. All three are dead. Dependency is given as the cause.

STRATFORD MAN KILLED.

Renfrew, Ont., May 2.—E. A. Cawsey, contractor, of Stratford, who had been in Renfrew for the last two years building macadam highways, concrete walks, etc., was killed yesterday afternoon by the breaking of a cable of one of the derricks, which was being removed just as a contract was being completed. One of the large timbers fell across him, shattering his ribs and injuring his lungs. He was removed to the hospital, but died from his injuries in an hour's time.

KILLED BY STREET CAR.

Detroit, May 2.—A fourteenth avenue car ran into three children at the corner of Wabash and Bagg streets yesterday afternoon. One of the children was killed outright, another so badly injured that it will probably die, and the third little fellow, aged 3, escaped. The injured child was taken to Harper Hospital.

TWO KILLED IN A STORM.

Guthrie, O. T., May 1.—A tornado passed over the town of Davenport, situated on the railroad, in Lincoln county, doing much damage to crops and stock. Several farm houses were blown down. Mrs. John Penn and her daughter, aged 10, were killed.

KILLED WITH BASEBALL BAT.

St. Joseph, Mo., May 2.—A named Brant, at Spink's Corners, is in serious trouble. It is claimed that he was struggling with the 15-year-old daughter of Calvin Hungerford, trying to get a baseball away from her, and that he struck her in the side with it. The girl was taken violently ill and died in a few days.

MARTYR TO HER SEX.

Portland, Ore., May 2.—Miss Faith Stewart, a popular young woman, is in a dying condition at her home as the result of an assault made upon her Sunday night by five men. She was walking along the street when five men met her and knocked her down, kicked her in the abdomen, and choked her until she became unconscious. CRUSHED TO DEATH.

Troy, N. Y., May 1.—Mrs. Catherine Mauney, aged 35 years, was killed by being crushed between two cars. She was passing a collar factory, when a wagon backed up, catching her and crushing her against the wall. Her injuries proved fatal.

BIG HOTEL THIEF NABBED BY POLICE.

One of the Cleverest Crooks in the Country—\$2,000 Worth of Plunder in His Room.

New York, May 2.—Frank O. Von Westlak, arrested for robbing a patron of a hotel, was yesterday nabbed by Capt. Titus to be one of the most expert, as well as dangerous hotel thieves in the country. Von Westlak is a desperado of the highest order, and police think crimes of a more serious nature than robbery may be traced to him. His picture has been sent to Chicago, from which city he recently came. He will be held until the Chicago authorities are heard from. In his room were found a heavy business bag, besides other criminal instruments. Von Westlak, when arrested, fought the detectives, endeavoring to get hold of the bugle. He was overcome with great difficulty.

Capt. Titus was notified Monday by the proprietor of the Grand Union Hotel that a room occupied by a musician was entered by a thief by means of false keys. From the room was taken jewelry valued at \$1,500, clothing valued at \$200 and money to the value of \$250. The proprietor of the hotel was without suspicion, believing that the thief was in no manner connected with the house. Capt. Titus sent Detective Sergeant Dugan and Kinser to work on the case. They closely questioned all hotel employees, and immediately suspected a window-washer named Von Westlak.

The detectives went at once to 212 East Twenty-fifth street, where Von Westlak was known to have a room. A search there convinced them they had made no mistake. They found a large amount of jewelry, some of much value. There were also 25 pawn tickets. Packed in a box was a large amount of silverware marked with the name of New York and Chicago hotels. When questioned by Capt. Titus, he practically admitted his guilt. He said he had been in New York only a few weeks, coming here from Chicago. There he had worked at the Great Northern Hotel, Leiland House and the Carlton. All these hotels had been robbed by him, but to what extent he refused to say.

BOTCOTT ON MEAT.

Bellefontaine, Ohio, May 1.—Four hundred employees in the Big Four shops here have signed an agreement to fight the beef trust by refusing to eat any meat for 30 days, beginning May 2.

DISASTROUS DROUGHT.

Santa Fe, N. M., May 1.—Reports from all parts of the territory indicate that sheep are dying by the hundreds. This is lambing season, and the number of lambs that will be saved will be unusually small. The range has practically dried up on account of the

drought. Added to the loss of the sheep men in the territory are reports that grasshoppers are already creating havoc in the Northern Rio Grande Valley. Around Santa Cruz the insects are thick as leaves on the fruit trees, and they are eating off clean early vegetables, etc.

TROUBLE FOR TEDDY!

Georgians Don't Like His Appointment of Colored Customs Officer.

Washington, May 2.—President Roosevelt has sent to the senate the appointment of a colored man, J. H. Devoaux, to be collector of customs at Savannah, and a beautiful fight is promised over his confirmation. The Savannah Cotton Exchange has wired both the Georgia senators to try and have the appointment rejected.

He delivered it, it is alleged that five years ago Mark Hanna, a leading politician, and it got the office. The cotton Exchange president wires Washington: "Mr. Roosevelt wants to be the next president, and he is constituting the highest office within the gift of the white people, bargaining for support of the Georgia delegation in the next Republican national convention."
