General Linevitch is now seeking to reach Harbin with an army estimated at 250,000 men. Marshal Oyama, despite the terrific strain of the two weeks' combat, is right at his heels, and threatening to envelope him by throwing a force across his line of retreat. From Tie Pass to Harbin is 300 miles, and should the Japanese succeed in destroying the railroad the Russians would face surrender. So close is the Japanese pursuit that great B. N. A. The conveyance of 450,000 fresh troops from European Russia to the far east would be performed very slowly at best, and would require many months. The mere mobilization would cost an immense sum and the Russian treasury is in

It is given out from St. Petersburg that the nego. tiations have not been broken off, but have been merely adjourned. This is not the view of the Rothschilds. Baron Rothschild, of London, is quoted as saying: "There is nothing more natural than, at the present time, with the affairs of Russia in the state that they are both at home and abroad, that it should become difficult at last to find subscribers in France to another Russian loan.
