**VEGETABLE GROWERS**  
**HOLD A MEETING**

Interesting Subjects Were Discussed  
by the Members.

A well-attended meeting of the Lon-  
don branch of the Ontario Vegetable  
Growers' Association was held in Duf-  
field block, on Saturday last.

After business routine, two very  
able papers were read by Messrs. Shar-  
man and Bartlett, comparing the  
profits of an acre of tomatoes grown  
for canning factories with those of an  
acre of potatoes or onions.

These called forth much spirited  
discussion, which finally ended in a  
resolution to supply the canning fac-  
tories with tomatoes for this year at  
30 cents per bushel.

The principal event of the after-  
noon was a very enthusiastic debate  
on the subject, "Resolved, that fresh  
manure is better as a fertilizer than  
rotted manure."

Able papers were given on the af-  
firmative side by Messrs. Johnson,  
Fuller, Moulton and Dengate; while  
the negative was stoutly championed  
by Messrs. Whitehall, Gard, McInnis  
and Davis. So many good points were  
brought out, that the judges had difficulty  
in reaching the decision, which was finally given  
in favor of the affirmative, and a very  
successful meeting was brought to a  
close, to meet again in three weeks.

**FUNERAL OF**  
**MRS. ROWELL**

Was Held Yesterday—Eloquent Trib-  
ute by Rev. Dr. Langford

The funeral of the late Mrs. Joseph  
Rowell was held from the family resi-  
dence, Restholme, 133 Elwood  
avenue, yesterday afternoon, to Mount  
Pleasant Cemetery, and was very  
largely attended.

The services were of a most im-  
pressive nature, and were conducted by  
Rev. A. K. Birks, of Askin Street  
Methodist Church, assisted by Rev.  
Dr. Langford, of Toronto, Rev. Dr.  
Brown, of St. Thomas, and Rev. E. B.  
Lanceley.

In speaking of Mrs. Rowell, Rev. Dr.  
Langford said that he had known her  
since young womanhood, and that in  
the course of a long pastorate, extend-  
ing over many years, he had been privi-  
leged to meet many beautiful char-  
acters, but none stood out more pre-  
eminently beautiful than that of Mrs.  
Rowell.

Floral tributes were many and  
beautiful, and among the tokens was  
a wreath from the Ladies' Aid of As-  
kin Street Church; a wreath from the  
Women's Foreign Mission Society, of  
which Mrs. Rowell was for many years  
president; and of which she was hon-  
orary president at the time of her  
death; and a wreath from the W. M. S.  
of the London conference branch.

The pallbearers were Messrs. James  
Coyne, St. Thomas; Thomas Oederidge,  
C. H. Ivey, London; Everett Smith, P.  
Clamp and E. Wright, of Toronto.

Relatives were present from Toron-  
to, Chatham and St. Thomas.

Mrs. Rowell is survived by one son  
and two daughters, Mr. Newton Row-  
ell, K. C., Toronto; Mrs. Gordon  
Wright, of this city, and Miss Mary  
Rowell, of Whitby College.

**LEGAL QUERIES**

**FLETCHER.**—My daughter acted as  
housekeeper for her second cousin,  
who at his death fifteen months ago  
left her by his will a legacy of \$1,000.  
His property was large enough to come  
under the succession duties act. The  
money has been paid to her by the  
executor, and has been by her invested  
in the west—in Alberta. My daughter  
has now been told that this legacy will  
be taxed under the succession duties  
act. Is that correct, and if so, what  
amount will be taken. I consider the  
law the most unjust of any on the  
statute books of Ontario. ANS.—The  
legacy was liable to a duty of 5 per  
cent, but as she has been paid in full  
it would seem that the executor has  
paid the duty and charged it to the  
estate.

**DIVORCE.**—How long does it re-  
quire a Canadian to be a resident of  
York State to get a divorce there, and  
what will it cost? ANS.—One year. The  
cost depends upon the evidence re-  
quired, \$200 and upwards.

How long does it require in Michi-  
gan, and what will it cost? ANS.—  
One year, cost \$100 and upwards.

If the wife will not sign the divorce,  
and the husband marries on the Ameri-  
can side, can the first wife claim her  
thirds of his property? ANS.—Yes.

Does the Canadian law recognize  
American divorces? ANS.—Not unless  
both parties were in the proper juris-  
diction and the court granted the  
divorce.

The grounds are adultery and deser-  
tion.

**More Air Space for New Hospital**  
**Architect Will Change His Plans**

**Committee Yesterday Discussed**  
**the Isolation Hospital—Im-**  
**provements Suggested.**

The special hospital committee consid-  
ered the plans for the isolation hospital at  
its meeting yesterday afternoon, and it  
was decided to call for tenders at once.  
The plans were discussed at some  
length, but were acceptable in the main.  
Chairman Stratton of the hospital  
trust was anxious to get as much air  
space as possible, and suggested that the  
cellings be made higher than at present.  
He thought that the gothic windows  
might be done away with, and the ceiling  
run flush with the roof so far as this  
was possible.

Mr. Nutter will reconstruct the plans to  
make this possible.

**Committee Appointed.**  
Ald. Garry and Ald. Booth were ap-  
pointed a committee to confer with the  
hospital trust re the changes suggested.  
Mayor Stetely received notification of  
the meeting to be held in Toronto be-  
ginning March 4, to consider the best  
means of combating tuberculosis.

The convention will be held in the Royal  
Alexandra Theater, and will be opened by  
Earl Grey.

A delegate was asked from London.  
The matter was left in the hands of the  
major to arrange.

man), Mayor Stetely, Ald. Garry, Rose,  
Booth and Beattie, Secretary Baker, City  
Engineer Graydon, Architect Nutter and  
Chairman Stratton, J. C. Judd, G. B.  
Harris, Superintendent Heard, of the  
Hospital Trust, and Dr. Niven, of the  
board of health.
