LEAGUE FOR RATIONAL SUNDAY

Toronto, Nov. 5.—The Rational Sunday League is out with a petition to the Senate and House of Commons, asking for the repeal of certain clauses of the Lord's Day act. The petition says in part: "Whereas many of the important business interests and industries of the Dominion are being injuriously interfered with and obstructed by the enforcement of the penal clauses of the Lord's Day act; and whereas a large number of the citizens of Canada do not approve of many of the coercive clauses of said act, as being unnecessarily restrictive of individual liberty, and desire that same shall be repealed; The aim is to secure 10,000 signatures. A large number are requested to secure ten signatures and these in turn will be asked to secure as many more. It is on the endless-chain principle. FLOOD OF GOLD FROM OLD WORLD POURING INTO AMERICAN MARKETS

\$7,000,000 on German Liner and Cunarder Carries an Immense Sum.

New York, Nov. 5.—The arrival of the first treasure ship laden with gold for the relief of the present stringency was the feature of the financial situation today. The Kron Prinzessin Cecilie brought \$7,000,000 in the yellow metal, which will go to strengthen New York bank reserves. The new Cunard liner Lusitania will follow closely in her wake with \$10,000,000 and \$14,000,000 more will follow during the remainder of the week and early next week. The additional withdrawals of \$750,000 from the Bank of England today for the United States and \$25,000 for Canada, brings up the total gold engagements on the present movement to about \$36,000,000. The news that the Bank of France bought today \$3,000,000 in sterling

bills on London was regarded here as an event of the first importance, as indicating that French financiers were not only able but willing to help London and thus indirectly to help America by relieving the strain on the Bank of England caused by the heavy American demands for gold.

It is hoped that this action of the Bank of France will deter the Bank of England from raising its discount rate to 7 per cent, at the meeting of the directors on Thursday and the Imperial Bank of Germany from raising its rate from 5½ to 7½ per cent. The inference is drawn that it is likely to have this effect because not since 1873 has the Bank of England rate been above 6 per cent, and only for twelve days in each of the years 1899 and 1900 has the German rate been above 6 per cent since 1870.

Those bankers who saw Secretary Cortelyou when he was in the city today, are convinced that there is no intention on the part of President Roosevelt to call an extra session of congress to pass any remedial financial legislation.

STANDARD FINE SCARED EUROPE

Gould Says U. S. Credits Are in a Bad Way on the Continent.

New York, Nov. 5.—George Jay Gould, returning today on the steamer Kron Prinzessin Cecilie from a six-months' automobile tour of Europe, discussed freely the European view of the recent financial crisis in this country.

"Our credits are in a bad way," said Mr. Gould. "The people of Europe received an awful scare, and they are still nervous and afraid of our securities. But their view is all wrong, and we have simply got to get together and put our shoulders to the wheel to restore confidence."

"In this connection I want to say something of Mr. Morgan. He is a trump, and he has saved us from a great disaster."

Mr. Gould was asked his opinion as to the cause of the uneasiness in Europe.

"I believe without hesitation," he said, "that the terrible sentence imposed upon the Standard Oil Company is the largest factor. To the people of Europe the fine looks like practical confiscation—the wiping out of hundreds of thousands of dollars in their view—and they believe that a similar fate to all the rest of the big corporations. They fear to put their money in the big concerns with the Standard Oil verdict dangling before them. The fine imposed by Judge Landis has immeasurably hurt us."

The freight it gave the investors on the other side was tremendous. "Asked if his railroads would continue their opposition to the two-cent fare laws in some states, Mr. Gould said: "It is unprofitable to carry passengers at so low a rate, and in some of the states we might better put the cars away and close up the passenger stations."

DETERMINED TO DIE

Picton Lady Attempts Suicide by Inhaling Gas From Stove.

Toronto, Nov. 5.—Mrs. Carter, wife of a well-to-do hardware merchant of Picton, made a determined effort to commit suicide this morning. The woman had been living apart from her husband, and with her two youngest children, a boy of 4 and a girl of 5 years, took apartments on Winchester street about three months ago. This morning the landlady heard the children screaming, and rushing into the room, found Mrs. Carter on the floor, with the tube from a gas stove in her mouth. The gas was turned on in her month, and she was immediately hurried to the general hospital, where, after the doctors had worked upon her for some time, she regained consciousness. This afternoon she was reported out of danger.

SUING FOR \$250,000.

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—Henry L. Sprague, a New York attorney, on behalf of himself and others, is suing J. B. Booth, lumber king and railway magnate, for \$250,000 for breach of contract in connection with an offer made by the syndicate for the purchase of the Canadian Atlantic Railway, since sold to the Grand Trunk. The New York syndicate put up \$500,000 to purchase the road for \$10,000,000, but failed to put up the balance in time, and the half-million was forfeited. It is for this half-million and \$200,000 damages that Sprague has taken suit.

MORE JAPANESE BOOKED FOR B. C.

Contracts Signed and Ships Are Chartered at Honolulu for First of Year.

Honolulu, Nov. 5.—Contracts have been signed and ships chartered for the conveyance of another lot of Japanese to British Columbia in the new year, the agitation resulting from the arrival of the other shiploads having had no effect upon the local emigration agents. According to Senator Charles F. Chillingworth and S. K. Muriyama, arrangements have been made with the Allan Line. The steamship Indravelli will be in port on January 2 ready to carry 600 Japanese to Vancouver, and two months later the Dean of Ruthven will be ready to take on board 1,200 Japs for transportation to Brazil. Plans for still further shipments in the future are being made, but details have not been perfected.

The Japs, according to Chillingworth, want to go. "Muriyama, who went to Vancouver with the other Japs, sent from Honolulu, has this to say: "There are absolutely no good grounds for the opposition to Japanese."

"There are more than enough work for all, and the only trouble is that there is not enough labor to go around. Why, in less than ten days after the Kumeric crowd landed there wasn't a Japanese of the lot who wasn't at work at from \$1.75 to \$2 per day. They were snapped up by contractors and rushed out in all directions. The only trouble is caused by the antagonism of the labor unions, and does not indicate that there is a lack of work in Canada, or that there is not a demand for more labor than can be supplied."

STRATHROY MINISTER CALLED TO PEMBROKE

Strathroy, Nov. 5.—The call of the Rev. W. J. Knox from Calvin Church, Pembroke, was before the Sarnia Presbytery today, sitting at Watford. Mr. Knox accepted the call upon its being sanctioned by the presbytery.

Rev. E. B. Horne, represented the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew. Messrs. Johnston and Gordon represented the congregation of Calvin Church, and the commissioners from Strathroy were Messrs. Scott and Coutray representing the session, and Messrs. Corrigan, Wyatt and Cameron representing the congregation.

Rev. E. B. Horne, of Watford, was appointed interim moderator, and will declare St. Andrew's pulpit vacant on the first Sunday in December.

MUST PAY \$1,000 FOR THAT GHOST STORY

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—The appeal of the Manitoba Free Press Company of Winnipeg against Nagay, arising out of libel proceedings against that paper for the publication of an article regarding an alleged haunted house in Winnipeg, was dismissed by the Supreme Court today with costs.

The judgment of the lower court held the paper liable for \$1,000 damages, and this decision stands.

SLUMP IN BOOK TRADE

Many Autumn Publications, But Business is Holding Back.

London, Nov. 5.—Autumn books are now coming out at a great rate, and, while the prospects of the season are good, trade seems to hang somewhat. The trouble is that year by year the boom is being compressed into a shorter period of time before Christmas.

It was bound to come, and quickly—a book on the game of diabol— and it was natural that it should come from C. B. Fry in co-operation with Philip Hart, father of the game as we know it. The volume deals with the real diabol, not the farcical and grotesque imitations which are all that are known to some people. The text will be illustrated with fifty photographs and diagrams.

Lane has in hand a book entitled "Legend in Japanese Art," descriptive of historical episodes, legendary characters, folklore, myths and religious symbolism as illustrated in the arts of old Japan. The book will include no less than five hundred illustrations, besides sixteen full-page prints in color. The author is Henri L. Joly, who for many years has been making notes from every specimen of such art that came under his notice. The price is not a popular one. It is 4 guineas.

"The Princess of Intrigue" of whom Noel Williams writes in a book so entitled is Mme. de Longueville, the beautiful daughter of Henri de Bourbon, Prince de Condé, and sister of the great Condé. The period, which is the last years of Louis XIII's reign and the early part of that of Le Grand Monarque, is one of the most fascinating in French history. Mazarin, Rochefoucauld, Turenne and Coligny all come into it.

"Peppy's Diary" we all know, and "Evelyn's Diary" we know by name, but "Dyott's Diary" is less familiar. It was kept by William Dyott of Freeford Hall, Staffordshire, a general in the British army, who started it at an

SUCCESSION DUES.

Toronto, Nov. 5.—The succession duty received by the Ontario Government in October aggregated \$44,432, from 33 estates. This makes a total for ten months, after deducting all refunds, of something over \$500,000.
