EDGAR DEY SUCCUMBS
TO HOCKEY INJURIES

Ottawa Athlete, Who Was Injured in
Maritime League Game, Passed
Away Yesterday.

Halifax, Feb. 13.—Edgar Dey, the hockey player, died this afternoon. He was injured in a Maritime Province League hockey game recently, and complications set in. He came originally from Ottawa. He was a great canoeist, having won the single blade competition of Canada and the United States. Three operations were performed in an effort to save the athlete's life. His mother came here from Ottawa when his condition became critical.

CUS RUHLIN FIGHTS
HIS LAST FIGHT

Former Heavyweight Pugilist Dies
Suddenly at His Home in
Brooklyn.

New York, Feb. 13.—Gus Ruhlin, once a leading heavyweight pugilist, died suddenly at his home in Brooklyn tonight. He was born in Akron, Ohio, and was about forty years old. In the days of the Horton law he was under the management of Billy Madison, and took part in some big battles. Tom Sharkey knocked him out in a round at Coney Island, but Ruhlin turned the tables in two other bouts. Ruhlin fought James J. Jeffries twice in California, the first battle was a 20-round affair, while Jeffries scored a knockout in five rounds in the second affair. Fitzsimmons stopped him in six rounds in Madison Square Garden after a sensational scrap. McCoy also got a decision over Ruhlin in twenty rounds in Syracuse. Ruhlin defeated Peter Maher and others, but he never showed championship calibre.

COMES TO ONTARIO

Manitoba Rinks Defeated the
Scotchmen in Final Test
Game.

FLAVELLE STILL WINNING
