McManigal on the witness stand in the trial of the forty-five accused "dynamite rioters" yesterday.

LIVERPOOL Cattle Market. LIVERPOOL, Nov. 9.—John Rogers & Co. cable there were no States or Canadian cattle on offer at Woodside Laidage today. The supplies of Irish stock were about equal to last week and prices remained unaltered at 11½c to 12½c per lb for Irish steers.

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 9.—There was an upward tendency in prices on the local markets today. Potatoes went as high as \$1.25 a ton, live hogs advanced from \$7.50 to \$7.75; eggs brought 35c; butter remained at 26c and 31c; lard, 18c to 20c; apples, 40c a bushel; chickens, 14c and 15c; ducks, 95c to 115c; wheat, 94c; oats, 85c; loose hay, \$14 to \$16; baled hay, \$17

to \$18. Farmers complain that fall plowing has been seriously interfered with, and in some districts held up altogether by wet weather.

STRAITFORD, Nov. 9.—Dressed poultry was plentiful on this morning's market. Especially chickens and ducks, with a fair showing also of geese at \$1.35 to \$1.50 each. Turkeys: Eggs, 35c per dozen; butter, 26c to 30c per lb; chickens, 60c to 70c per pair; ducks, 60c to 80c each; potatoes, \$1 per bag; wheat, 92c per bushel; oats, 37c per bushel; hay, \$13 per ton; hogs, alive, \$7.35 to \$7.40 per cwt; wool, washed, 19c to 20½c per lb; hides, 11c to 12c per lb; calveskins, 13c to 14c per lb. The continued wet weather has kept the fall plowing back, and in some cases has prevented farmers getting their potatoes and root crops up.

BULGAR BESIEGERS DRIVEN BACK, SAYS TURK COMMANDER

Adrianople Garrison Checks the Bombardment of the City According to Shukri.

SERBIA DETERMINED TO SECURE PORT

Still a Grave Danger of Austria and Russia Coming to Blows.

Adrianople, Nov. 11, 3:45 p.m.—(By indirect route via Odessa, Russia.)—The bombardment of this city by the Bulgarians began again yesterday, and continued today from the south and west. In the afternoon it stopped and Shukri Pasha, the military commander, had placards posted all over the city announcing the victory of the garrison, which had repulsed the Bulgarian attacking force around Marus and had driven the besiegers a considerable distance into the surrounding country.

A Sory Picture. London, Nov. 11.—A sorry picture of the conditions at Thessalonica is given by one of the Daily Telegraph's correspondents. He arrived at Constantinople Thursday after riding several days from Thessalonica with the retreating Turks. He sends the following dispatch from Constantinople:

"Never for a single mile had there been a break in the endless chain of retreating soldiers and refugees. We had not seen a single soldier, a single man without arms, without food, without morale, and whose officers seemed to have completely disappeared."

"I do not think that the Turks had even taken the trouble to blow up the railway line behind them. When we heard that the city was being retaken, we were told that it was an impossible position. Surely here the retreat would cease. We would find an army prepared to make a last stand for Islam."

Obsolete Guns. "At Hademkeul there were only one or two forts armed with obsolete guns. There were 4,000 troops, a majority of whom were wandering about the village in a semi-starved condition, although only twenty miles from Constantinople."

"We met a lieutenant-general riding aimlessly about, followed by an escort of four orderlies and preceded by two aides. He told us that he had an army of 150,000 men, and that there were 200,000 more coming from Constantinople. Then he rode off, apparently in search of something, looking for the phantom army which existed only in his imagination."

Joined Hands. London, Nov. 11.—The vanguard of the third Serbian army has joined hands with the Montenegrins in the valley of the Drina River, says a Belgrade dispatch to the Daily Telegraph. Both armies are advancing along the seacoast to Durazzo.

Vienna Excited. Vienna, Nov. 11.—There is much excitement here over the possibility of war between Austria and Russia, which is talked of. The reports that mobilization is imminent, however, is officially denied. On the contrary, it is said that Austria will wait until the war is ended before opening formal negotiations with Serbia.

Count Von Berchtold, the Austrian foreign minister, had a conference with the emperor at Budapest on Saturday. Afterwards he summoned a special conference at the palace, at which Gen. Aulendorf, the Austro-Hungarian minister of war, Gen. Schena, chief of the general staff, and the Hungarian premier, M. Lukacs, were present.

The emperor later received in audience the German ambassador. It is also reported that Archduke Franz Ferdinand will shortly visit the German emperor at one of his shooting boxes, and much importance is attached to this meeting.

Servia Stands Firm. London, Nov. 11.—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily Mail learns that the threats of the Austrian-Serbian crises are now in the hands of the German secretary for foreign affairs, Herr von Krieger-Wachter, who is working on a formula designed to appease both Austria and Serbia.

The Daily Mail's Sofia correspondent says that preliminary conversations have been held with Austria in the name of the Balkan League. The latter has made every possible concession, but maintains that a Serbian outlet to the Adriatic is absolutely essential.

Press and public opinion in St. Petersburg, according to a dispatch to the Daily Mail from the Russian capital, consider a conflict between Russia and Austria imminent, if Austria continues to threaten Serbia.

The Daily Mail's correspondent with the Turks, describing the demoralization as shown in the disorderly retreats, remarks that there were very few regulars among those who took to flight, nearly all of whom were parchment-skinned peasants of the reserves.

He adds: "One can only suppose that the majority of the regulars had remained behind and were killed. As for the ghastly lack of efficient transportation for the wounded, it would need a Zola to describe the horrors endured by the men hit in battle. I asked a doctor how it was that the wounded men I saw were only injured in the limbs. He replied: 'Because those hit in the body die.'"

BattleShip Safe. London, Nov. 11.—A dispatch from Malta to the Post says that a rumor is prevalent that the British cruiser Barham has met with an accident. One report has it that she struck a Turkish mine.

A Malta dispatch to the Telegraph, however, says that the reports being circulated regarding a mishap to a battleship are without foundation.

Twenty British warships are now in Turkish waters. Ships are calling at Malta in unprecedented numbers. The markets have been cleared to supply them and prices are rapidly rising.

"This headlong flight of the population eastwards and southwards is no ordinary fugitives' flight from home scenes, to which they will return, I do not believe that they can or will return to Thessalonica."

"There is and has been for a week no one beyond Thessalonica. The hordes seem to have fallen back toward Constantinople, as they came across from Asia Minor years ago, and advanced toward Budapest and Vienna by instinct. Now their villages have all been burned and they will erect villages on the other side of the Bosphorus. It will be surprising if such a home is not found for them by the Constantinople Government. Their existence under the walls of the capital will certainly have an untoward effect on its population and hardly seems advisable in the interest of anyone."

London, Nov. 11.—The Washington correspondent of the Morning Post says that Ambassador Bryce informed President Taft that he would retire shortly and devote himself to literature.

Sir Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice, now British minister at Stockholm, will succeed Mr. Bryce.

Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice was born in 1857 and was created K. C. M. G. in 1906. He has served as secretary of state at Washington and as secretary to the British delegates to the international maritime conference, Aug. 27, 1880. After serving for a time at Brussels and Tole he was transferred to Washington in 1893. He was charge d'affaires at Tehran in 1900 and minister to Persia in 1905-08.

Tired of Cares. London, Nov. 11.—That James Bryce

intended soon to resign from the ambassadorship at Washington was known in London three months ago. It was expected that he would retire after his Australian trip. He had told a few friends that he was tired of the cares of office and wished to devote the rest of his life to literature.

It was generally supposed that the Government would go outside the regular diplomatic service for his successor and select some statesman or publicist of exceptional promise, as it did when it appointed Bryce. For example, the names of J. Alfred Spindler, editor of the Westminster Gazette, and Louis Harcourt, secretary of state for the colonies, have been freely canvassed. Sir Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice, who will receive the appointment to Washington, is considered one of the ablest of Great Britain's regular diplomatists.

Establish Schools. "The second recommendation was that schools be established throughout the province. Districts should be formed with a centre, where the school would be located.
