OVER MILLION DOLLARS IN PROPERTY CHANGED **'HANDS HERE DURING MAY**

Surpasses May of 1920 by \$17,058—Total Consideration For First Five Months of 1921 Is \$3,094,039—Figures For Year Expected To Exceed 1920.

property transfers for the city of London during the month of May amounts to \$1,073,066, surpassing the total for May, 1920, by \$17,058. That some big. property deals were put through this year is evidenced by the fact that although there were 398 transfers in May ast year, compared to 333 during a simi-ar period in 1921, the latter involves a bigger total consideration.

240 PASSENGERS ABOARD.

Paris, June 10.-The mail packet Bouboulina, which has been sunk in the Aegean by a mine, had 240 passengers on board, besides a crew of 25, says an Athens dispatch to hte Radio Agency. The Bouboulina was formerly the steamer Coronilla. She was built at Newcastle, England, in 1878, and was owned by C. G. Bouboulis of Spazia. Her registered tonnage was 1,312.
