All Italy Pays Tribute to the **Memory of Great** Tenor.

REALIZED END AT HAND

Thousands gathered at a solemn requiem mass celebrated at the Church of Madonna Della Gracia, or tood uncovered along the streets lead ng to that edifice while the funeral cor n the impressive ceremonies were many nen and women who have played stellar

roles on the operatic stage.

The body was clad in evening clothes and over it was shed the mellow light of four candles, two at the head and two at the feet. At the dead tenor's side ere garlands of roses arranged person ally by Mrs. Caruso.

The master singer, who had for nearly quarter of a century enacted roles in which death was an unseen player, ap parently was cognizant of his critical condition, following his sudden illness on Monday. Just before he sank into the coma which was the prelude to the end, as said to his son, Rodolfo:
"I feel very ill. This time it will be

Amendment to Bill Exempts Two Per Cent Beer From Restrictions.

London, Aug. 3.—(By Canadian Press).

—After an all-night sitting of the House of Commons gave a third reading to the much-discussed licensing bill regulating the sale of intoxicating liquors in England and Scotland. A new clause was added, providing that certain liquor not containing more than two per cent of proof spirits should not be treated as intoxicating, if an excise license was not required for its sale. The attorney-general did not object to this clause. He gave it as his opinion that the making of light beers should be encouraged.

Despite considerable opposition an amendment was passed fixing the number of hours for the sale of intexicating TWO UNDER ARREST liquors under the bill at eight, outside of the city of London.

#### LONDON-TO-LAMBETH HIGHWAY COMPLETED AS FAR AS BRICK ST.

Contractors Are Six Weeks Ahead of Time — Organization Includes Provision of Sleeping and Feeding Accommodation For Workers-No Accident Has Marred Job-Records in Work Are Feature-One Hundred Men Are Employed.

The London to Lambeth concrete highway, in course of contruction by the Lumsden Construction and Transport Company, has been opened from the city limits to Brick street, and the entire 41/2 miles of new road will be completed by the end of this mouth. This was announced today by W. W. Smith, engineer in charge of the job, but owing to the fact that the concrete must be allowed to set, the road will not be open to traffic until September 15.

The contract with the Government requires that this section of highway be completed by November 1, and aided by favorable weather and other conditions the contractors are now six week ahead of time on this job. Approximately 100 men are employed by the construction company, with skilled labor recruited from local ranks. The majority of the employees, reside at the construction camp maintained by the contractors at Lambeth, where all supplies are purchased. Here excellent meals and sleeping quarters are provided at cost, the expenses being deducted from Altogether the each employee's pay. Made Canadian Record.

Last week 2,463 feet of pavement were laid, which is almost half a mile, and three-fourths of a mile has been laid during the last ten days. The contractors established a new Canadian record during this period, when in one day they completed 563 feet of pave ment, utilizing 600 tons of material, including almost two cars of cement, As the work nears Lambeth, with a shorter haul for gravel, this record will be surpassed.

The new highway is to be 30 feet in width, 20 feet of which is of concrete, with a five-foot gravel shoulder on either side. John Sears, provincial highways inspector, is constantly on the job in the interest of the Govern-000, and the contract will net the company \$175,000.
