

Demar of Melrose raced in far ahead of the field and won the 28th American marathon conducted by the Boston A. A. He covered the Olymoic distance of 26 miles, 385 yards, from Hopkinton to Boston, in 2 hours, 29 minutes and 401-5 seconds. After the contest the first five men After the contest the first five men were selected to represent the United States in the Olympic games. There were 140 runners. The Olympic record of 2:32:35 4-5 was made by Hannes Kohlemainen at Antwerp in 1920. Frank T.
