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QUEBEC IS CALLED ANCHOR OF CANADA

**Sir James Aikens Lauds Spirit
of Province—Plead For
Unity.**

Canadian Press Despatch.
Quebec, Sept. 8.—Unity on the
part of all the provinces in the do-
minion was the keynote of the ad-
dresses delivered here this evening
at the reception tendered by Hon.
Mr. Perceval, lieutenant-governor
of Quebec, to the lieutenant-
governors of Canada. Among the
speakers were Sir J. A. M. Aikens,
lieutenant-governor of Manitoba, Col.
the Hon. Harry Cockshutt, lieuten-
ant-governor of Ontario, and Pre-
mier Taschereau.

Hon. Harry Cockshutt said that
the drawing together of the different
provinces was greatly to be desired
in Canada. He touched on the need
for nation-wide development.
"The future," he said, "is one of
great prosperity, one of contentment

in which the men of the north will
stand out." He made a plea for
honesty and truthfulness.
Sir James Aikens said the unfor-
tunate thing was that Canadians did
not understand each other. He dwelt
on the Elgin treaty enacted in the
United States many years ago and
said that this treaty had been
responsible for confederation, for it
had forced the four provinces to join
forces, and from these four provinces
had evolved the nine provinces which
composed the dominion today. But
the country was not in its infancy,
in "go-cart" days.

SPANISH TROOPS LAND ON MOROCCAN COAST

recommended a relaxation of the

the resolution, which was moved
yesterday by Motilal Nehru, the
leader of the Swarajists, providing
for fundamental changes in the con-
stitution and the administration was
adopted by a vote of 71 to 45.

Jinnah Gour, the leader of the in-
dependents, was loudly applauded
when he declared, in alluding to the
question of Indians in the services,
that he could produce 10,000 youths
who were suitable to receive the
king's commission.

DOMINION FLOATS \$75,000,000 ISSUE

**Government Concludes Year's
Financing Program With
Internal Loan.**

Toronto, Sept. 8.—Announcement
has just been made by Hon. J. A.
Robb, minister of finance, that the
dominion government has concluded
its financial plans for the year by
disposing of a new issue of \$75,000,-
000 fifteen-year 4½ per cent bonds
through a strong Canadian syndicate,
consisting of Dominion Securities
Corporation, Limited, Wood, Gundy
& Company, A. E. Ames & Company,
Limited, and National City Company,
Limited, the Bank of Montreal, the
Royal Bank of Canada and the Cana-
dian Bank of Commerce.

The bonds are being offered today
to the public through practically
every bond dealer and stock broker
in Canada, as well as through char-
tered banks. In arranging for this
long-term financing in Canada rather
than in another market, the govern-
ment has followed the policy that
has been almost rigidly adhered to
during the last several years. The
Victory Loans of 1917, 1918 and 1919
were planned for the Canadian
market solely and the refunding
loans of 1923 and 1924 were offered
in the same manner.

Short Terms in U. S.
Short term financing, such as one-
year note issues, have been placed in
United States, where the demand
for such short-term bonds is so
strong that such borrowing is cheap.
These short-term notes, however, are
of interest only to the large financial
institutions and others who definitely
require the return of their money
within a very short period.

It is understood that the proceeds
of the new issue will be used for re-
funding purposes, including the re-
funding of \$42,000,000 of tax-free
bonds, which will fall due on Decem-
ber 1 next. In this matter also, the
strict policy of retiring tax-free
bonds by the usual taxable issue is
being followed.

The maturity of the bonds is
fifteen years. In other words, they
run for the same number of years
as the 1924 maturity bonds when is-
sued in 1919, and which have become
so popular among investors of all
classes.

Interest Return Is 4.75.
The new bonds are being offered
at 97.25 and interest, at which the
interest return is over 4.75 per cent.
Because of the success of the 1923
and 1924 refunding loans, it is be-
lieved in financial circles that the
present issue will be quickly snapped
up.

Investors who were fortunate
enough to have purchased the 1923
issue of refunding loan bonds have
had the satisfaction of watching their
bonds rise in value by more than
four points, while those who pur-
chased last year have also witnessed
a substantial improvement upon the
price paid. It is a fact that all
Dominion of Canada issues floated
since the war are now selling at a
substantial premium over the
original price.

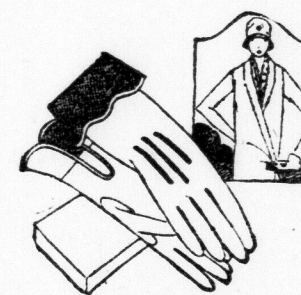

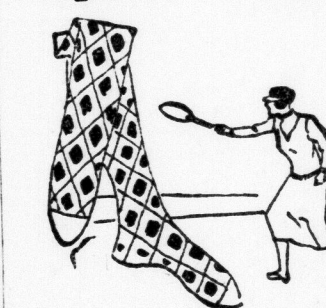

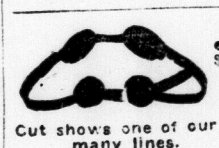
