

U. S. PEACE DELEGATES RETURN FROM MEXICO

Restoration of Diplomatic Relations Looked For at an Early Date.

Mexico City, Aug. 16.—The representatives of the United States who participated in a conference with Mexican officials which resulted in the drawing up and signing of ar agreement designed to make possible the resumption of diplomatic relaions between the two countries left for Washington today.
