FOREST COMMISSION IS NOW COMPLETE

Archibald Fraser the Last Appointee—Will Look After Crown Lands.

It was announced Monday that Archibald Fraser of Fredericton, has been appointed by the Minister of Lands and Mines, representative of the private timber land owners upon the Forest Commission which is to have charge of the crown lands of New Brunswick, under the legislation passed at the last session of the Legislature. The other members are: Hon. E. A. Smith, Lt. Col. T. G. Loggie, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines; G. H. Prince, Chief Forester; D. J. Buckley, representative of the holders of timber licenses.


