

After lying in terrible agony for four days and a half, John Cooper, the 15-year-old lad who was so dread-fully scalded at Davies' packing house last Wednesday, succumbed to his in-juries in the General Hospital at 8 o'clock last night. Since his admit-tance to the hospital he has been rap-idly sinking and no hope of saving his life was entertained by the doc-tors.
