TORONTO MARKETS.

Toronto, March 7.—Lower prices and a general lack of interest obtained this morning on the local live stock market. No export business was transacted, there being no shipping cattle on offer and no buyers had there been—and only to a very limited extent was there any buying of butcher stocks.

Practically no cattle has so far this week been shipped to Eastern points. Montreal buyers have withdrawn from the market on account of the effect Lent is having on the trade in that city, and they are not expected to return until after Easter. This leaves only Toronto, Hamilton and London as consuming centres, and even from these places there is so weak an enquiry that about 2000 head of cattle a week would be sufficient to meet all demands.

The receipts to-day were 58 cars, containing 935 cattle, 720 sheep and lambs, 300 hogs and 70 calves. On the whole the quality of this offering was fair, and yet it was long after noon before anything was sold.

Not one sale of beef was reported at yesterday's top level of \$6 a cwt. The greater part of the offering was disposed of at prices ranging from \$5.35 to \$5.90, and only in a very few instances were the latter price paid.
