## HALTED THE FIGHT.

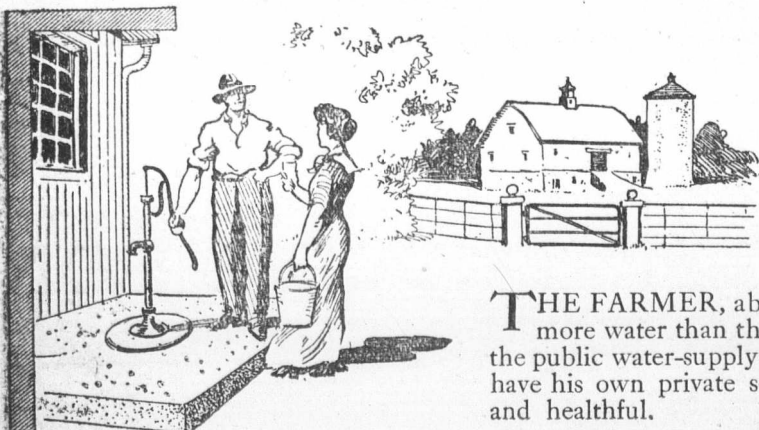
