SHORT LESSONS IN LAWN TENNIS

39. Ladies Doubles.
Ladies' doubles as a rule are played a good deal more from the base line than is the case in men's doubles where the great object of all players is to get to the net. In a minor way this is good advice to give for ladies' doubles. For undoubtedly a pair of good lady volleyers will beat a pair of good base line players provided the former go up to the net occasionally at the proper time. It is useless to attempt to go to the net on short balls. And in a ladies' doubles you should not go to the net unless you have driven your opponent well behind the base line.

It is a mistake likewise for one girl to go to the net and one to stay back. Keep in line the same as in men's doubles, and if you are base line players and are being beaten by two good volleyers use the lobe to break up their game. Send your services well back in court and keep in line throughout. Never stand between the service and base lines. If you cannot go up to the net regularly stay behind the base line from which point you can always run up to take a short return if necessary.

40. Mixed Doubles Formation.
The best way to play a mixed doubles when possible is just as if it were played by two men. As a rule this is not feasible, for the majority of ladies cannot volley as well as men and their own strokes are not severe enough to follow up to the net. They are also as a rule less fleet of foot.

For this reason mixed doubles have a tendency to develop into one at the net, and one at the service line, particularly when the girl is serving. If the girl is not a strong volleyer it is really better for her to stay at the back of the court and cover all balls which are out of her partner's reach. Probably the greatest mistake that most men make in mixed doubles is poaching. The man should only take a shot which is intended for his partner when he is certain of making an ace, otherwise he should allow the ball to go back to the girl. If the girl is a good volleyer she should stand at the net, particularly if the man has a good service, as she can there cut off any returns that come her way.

As a rule the girl should play in the right court and the man in the left for three reasons. First, he is usually better able to handle the service on his back hand. Secondly, all the vital points are scored on this side of the court when duce has been called, and thirdly, he can cover his partner's back hand which are in the center of the court.

41. Mixed Doubles (Continued).
Mixed doubles often resolves itself into an effort of one side always to send the ball back to the opposing girl, while she in turn attempts to place her ball out of the reach of the opposing man and into that of his partner in order to give her own partner a good chance to kill a return.

When in a mixed doubles match to attempt to serve slowly to the opposing lady, or to make weak strokes to her, is not playing the game to your own partner. Of course, there is no necessity to smash directly at a girl with the possibility of hitting her, but the man should genuinely endeavor to score on every possible occasion. The man must take risks in mixed doubles game as it is his volleying on which the winning of the game depends. I believe the best shot for a girl to use when the opposing man is at the net is a good lob over his head. This stroke forces him back from the net and gives partner a chance to run in, and accept a volley return. The same thing applies to mixed doubles as to men's doubles, namely, that if

County Council Special Session on Road Revision

Advisory Board of Provincial Highway Department Will Explain System

The advisory board of the provincial department of public highways will meet the Lambton county council in a special session in Sarnia on Wednesday, July 8th, to discuss the proposed revision of the county road system outlined in a map forwarded by the department at the June session.

The changes in the systems by which certain roads would revert to township control and others would go on the county system were discussed at some length at the June session of the council but the adoption of the bylaw providing for the revision was deferred. The measure will be passed at the special session unless some unexpected snag is encountered as it is stated the council has no option in the matter.

John Huey, clerk of Lambton county, has been appointed by Kent County Council to equalize the assessment of the various municipalities of that county. The council of that county has been unable to come to a satisfactory agreement and decided to secure a neutral man to work out the equalization. Mr. Huey's work since his appointment as Lambton county clerk has won recognition and he was selected as the one to handle this important task which entails considerable work.
