DANGEROUS RAILWAY CROSSING.

NEGLECT OF COUNTY COUNCIL.

ED. PLAINDEALER. Dear sir:—Could you find space in your valuable paper to direct the attention of the interested and responsible parties to the condition of the crossing at the intersection of the G. W. R. R., and the townline between Howard and Harwich. There is a high grade at this point; and the railway furnishes an under-crossing, with two tracks, one being dug down considerable lower than the other, so as to allow loads of hay or other high loads to pass under the track. A pool of water stands at this place nearly all the time, and frequently loads of cheese boxes and empty barrels have to be unloaded to get under the track. A few days ago a threshing machine made an attempt to get through; but the water was frozen so as to hold up the load, causing the top of the machine to come in contact with the timbers above. While the men were thus engaged cutting the ice away, a spirited team of horses being attached to the engine which made an attempt to pass through the other track without a driver, that also came in contact with the timbers above and stuck there good and fast; but the team made good their escape, and performed what is called a runaway,
