SUPREME COURT.

Supreme Court met in Annapolis on Tuesday, the 11th inst., His Honor, Judge Ames presiding. Besides the local bar there were present Messrs. Harrington and Graham from Halifax, and Roscoe from Kentville.

The first case on trial was Beals vs. Strohach. This was an action to recover the amount of \$500, liquidated damages for breach of performance in conveying land.

Morse vs. Gavasa was the second case tried. This was an action brought by the Plaintiff as surviving partner of the late firm of Morse and Gavasa, against the Defendant, as Administrator of T. A. Gavasa, deceased.

Beals vs. Canada Fire and Marine Insurance Co., was the next case. This was an action for the amount of policy, viz: \$1,300, subject to the opinion of the Court.
