The Clergymen's Moustache. Recently an attack was made by a clergyman on clerical beards, and priests who wear these facial adornments were warned that they were a stumbling-block to their congregations.

"I am convinced, after a great deal of observation, that the clerical moustache, in particular, has a injurious effect upon the brain." The Strawberry. The principal points involved in the successful culture of the strawberry are: 1. Prepare the ground by deep plowing and subsoiling; apply a dressing of rotted manure, equal to twenty cubic per acre; spread it over the surface, and mix it with the soil by repeated disintegration with a harrow. The best crops are produced on strong loamy soil; if somewhat clayey it will all the better provided it is drained.

2. Allow the plants plenty of space; the rows thirty inches apart, and the plants about half that distance between each other in the rows. 3. Remove all runners as they appear, and keep the surface pulverized and clean. If young plants are wanted, keep a portion of the plantation for that purpose. 4. Cover the plants in winter in all localities where the thermometer may run down to 10 degrees Fahrenheit; this to be done after the first frost, using straw, leaves or other similar material as a partial protection. 5. Do not disturb the roots by any process of cultivation from the month of September until after crop has been gathered the following summer.

6. Destroy the plantation after it has produced its second crop, new ones being planted to succeed those that are abandoned. Ages of Various Animals. Scientists have lately been interested in ascertaining the ages that, under favorable conditions, will be attained by various well known animals (says Scribner), and a series of observations, extending through a long course of years, has afforded some interesting results. The age of the squirrel rarely exceeds 8 years, that of the rabbit 7; sheep will live 10 years; dogs have been known to exceed 20; cats and foxes rarely go beyond 15, while pigs, deer, the bear and the cow have often lived beyond 20 years; the horse has been known to exceed 30; the porcupine lives as long as the lion 20; the camel, the eagle, the raven, and the tortoise have been known to pass 100; one or two swans have been known to pass 100 years; the elephant, the swan being exceptionally long-lived; elephants 400 years old have been known; while judging from the size and the growth of the whale, naturalists have been led to believe that this animal will, under favorable conditions, attain 1,000 years.

Playing Tricks With Vegetables. Some very pleasant surprises for children may be obtained by getting fruits to grow in glass bottles. The following is a list of the cucumber family, can be inserted into the narrow mouths of bottles while young, the bottles attached to the branch, and after full growth it will be a mystery how these fruits got inside the bottles or jars. Besides the pleasant surprise, many a youthful learner on plant growth can be furnished by these facts. It is stated that King George III. of England, in the earlier stages of the insanity which subsequently overtook him, used to express his surprise to those who were dining with him at a banquet table laden with the dainties, but with these fruits in glass jars the surprise to even sane people are quite as interesting as the apple dumplings was to this unfortunate monarch.

Had a long Balloon Trip. M. Maurice Malt describes what he claims to be the longest balloon ascent on record. His balloon, Les Levantes des Villes, started on the gas works of La Villette, Paris, on Oct. 23, and the voyage terminated at Wallen, in central Germany, after a journey of 2500 miles, and a total journey of 26 hours 10 minutes above ground. The flight was interrupted several times by the snow which fell in the higher regions of the atmosphere, and the balloon regained its ascending power. During one of these descents it was stopped and caulked by a Prussian soldier, who had followed it at a gallop for some distance. The route passed over part of Belgium, the Tonnus and the Odenwald, and the towns of Metz and Frankfurt were recognized in passing.
