No person shall sell or offer, expose or have in his possession for sale, any fruit packed in a close package, upon which package is marked any designation which represents such fruit as of No. 1, or XXX, finest, best or extra good quality, unless such fruit consist of well-grown specimens of one variety, sound, of nearly uniform size, of good celor for the variety, of normal shape, and not less than ninety per cent, free from scab, worm holes, bruises and other defects."
