Minutes of the Semi-Annual session read and approved.

Minutes of the Special Session 1909 read and approved.

Ordered that the standing Committees of 1910 be the same as 1909.

Upon reading the petition of David Millner and upwards of twenty others freeholders of the County of Annapolis asking for the changing of the course of the highway leading from Granville to Parker's Cove and upon reading the report of the Committee appointed to inquire into said change David Milner, Geo. A. Gilliat and Edward Bartheaux.

It was ordered that the report as read be received and adopted.

Following is the report:

To the Warden and Councillors of the Municipality of Annapolis:

Your Committee appointed to examine the proposed alteration in the Highway leading from Granville to Parker's Cove, beg leave report that they have carefully examined the site for the proposed alteration, and find that the alteration would not improve the road, and that the present road, or the location of the present road, is as good as any that can be found in that particular locality.

Your Commissioners therefore have decided not to lay out any new road.

Ordered that the Scott Act Inspectors report as read be received and laid on the table to be disposed of this afternoon.

Upon reading the petition of Mrs. Agnes Shaw and upwards of twenty others freeholders of the County of Annapolis and upon reading the report of the Commissioners, Andrew Walker, LeBaron Phinney and Howard Roy and the report of J. B. Whitman, surveyor, approving said road, the notices of the opening of the said road and it appearing that the law had in all respects been complied with it was ordered that all proceedings thereunder be confirmed and that said New Road be opened and become a public road in the County of Annapolis.

Ordered that the report of the Superintendent of the County Hospital as read be received and adopted.

Following is the report.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF COUNTY HOSPITAL.

To the Warden and Councillors of the Municipality of Annapolis County

Gentlemen,—I beg leave to submit the Superintendent's report of the Annapolis County Hospital for the year ending Nov. 30th., 1909.

The admissions numbered 21. Of these 8 were from Annapolis County; 1 from Hants; 7 private; 4 from Yarmouth, and 1 from Digby County.

The number of admissions exceeded that of any previous year, except 1895 and 1905. 2 patients were discharged as cured, 1 transferred to the Digby County Home and one to the Nova Scotia Hospital, the latter becoming so violent that we were unable to keep her. Of these the first two were from Annapolis County; one from Digby and one private.

Owing to the fact that of the 49 patients now resident in the Hospital 24 are not of the County, and further that the cost of supplies has steadily advanced during the last few years, I would suggest that a readjustment be made of the terms for maintenance except in private cases, where there may be circumstances justifying a departure from the ordinary rates, and when special arrangement may be made as to the amount to be paid.

I would further suggest that when a patient is destructive, or from violence, or otherwise requires special attention, the additional expenses be paid for in the same manner as the ordinary expenses.

I must again refer to the usual difficulty in procuring sufficient help, for at no time during the year did we have the required number.

This not only conflicts with the best interests of the Hospital, but adds largely to the already arduous duties of the Superintendent and Matron. This is far from encouraging, especially when the remuneration received is so small, even though their duties were not largely extended, due to the constant shortage of help. An appreciative increase in the first instance would not, I think, be extravagant, to say nothing of the second.

ADMISSIONS.

It is not my intention at this time, to again repeat that which I have so often done in former reports, viz., the regulations for the admissions of patients, but circumstances compel me to again call the attention of those who desire to admit patients to the Hospital that the necessary course must be pursued.

One more feature in the way of admissions, and to which I wish to refer, and that is the admission of mentally deranged patients to the County Home, with the intention of having the examination at that Institution and finally the transfer to the County Hospital. Were it not that the condition of the patient was actually known, there would be no just reason for complaint, but when it is quite evident that several cases have been admitted to that Institution, with the intent that they be transferred to the Hospital, there is every reason for criticism. Not only is it a source of annoyance and inconvenience to the management, but unconstitutional, and the necessary information for admission can scarcely, if ever, be obtained under these conditions.

Whenever the admission of a patient to the Hospital is sought for, application is made to the Superintendent upon the prescribed form (the statement). This form is made out by the nearest relative or friend, and if the information asked for therein be carefully and accurately written out, it is the chief source on which reliance can be placed insofar as the previous history and present condition of the patient is concerned, and it is upon

Annapolis County Farmers' Association

The Annapolis County Farmer's Association was convened at Lawrence town on the 4th of Jan. In the absence of the President, F. W. Bishop, Vice President presided. Secretary's report showed that 33 Institute meetings had been held, 23 places had been visited by the speakers and 1200 people listened to them. Messrs. Woodworth and Robinson were well received and gave much valuable information and we trust awakened a renewed interest in the farm work. Dr. Standish who is instructor at the Agricultural College at Truro had 14 meetings. His authority is unquestioned. Some are afraid of his criticism. He was particularly pleased with his stay at Bear River. \$90.59 was spent in the work during the year. It is hoped that more institute meetings will be held during the coming year. A large number of Directors have been appointed hoping to cover most of the County. (The membership for past year is 177).

We were disappointed in not having Col. Spurr's address as well as F. W. Foster's on Dairying. Mr. R. J. Messer gave a practical talk on some experience in making and using manure. Mr. F. M. Chipman on cultivation of soil, Mr. D. M. Balcom on the treatment of the cow. In the evening Dr. Hall spoke pleasantly and optimistically of farm work and life. Mr. Chipman gave a very interesting report of the Fruit Growers' Association.

Bank of Nova Scotia

One of the best statements ever by any Canadian Bank is the seventy-eighth annual report of the Bank of Nova Scotia, a copy of which appears in this week's Monitor-Sentinel. Net profits for the year were \$604,123.27 equal to more than 20 per cent on their \$3,000,000 capital. Deposits now total over thirty-five millions, an increase of nearly four millions over the previous year. Besides paying the usual 12 per cent dividend the sum of \$100,000 was added to the Reserve Fund, which now stands at \$5,500,000, an amount equal to 183.3 per cent of the Bank's capital. For the past few years it has been the custom of this Bank to submit its books and statements to independent audit by chartered accountants, so that it may readily be seen that no pains are spared to place its affairs before the public in a fair and impartial manner.

WEALTHY ENGLISH FARMERS

FOR NOVA SCOTIA

Rev. Mr. Goldie, Immigration Official Arrives from England on Tunisian to Discuss Immigration Scheme with Government.

Among the passengers who arrived on the mail steamer Tunisian from Liverpool was Rev. McLean Goldie, formerly immigration chaplain at Deepwater terminus, and now representing the Nova Scotia government as an immigration official in England. He arrived here on the Herald on Monday.

Goldie said that the propaganda to bring new settlers to this province was progressing most favorably and that Nova Scotia was fast becoming conspicuous as a province for settlers. Mr. Goldie said that early in April a large number of wealthy farmers would settle in this province. Referring to the voyage, he said that it was the roughest he had ever experienced and he had crossed the Atlantic sixteen times. The object of Mr. Goldie's visit is to discuss an immigration scheme with the government.

Woodworth Brought Back For Trial

Detective Frank Hanrahan returning from Denver, Colorado, last evening with Laurie C. Woodworth in custody, who is charged with obtaining sums of money under false pretences. The detective made a flying trip to Denver and back. He left here a week ago last Friday night and made the round trip in ten days.

Woodworth agreed to return and face the charges that have been preferred against him. He made no statement, and so far as can be learned he had very little money in his possession when arrested.

Fire Destroys School Imperilling Children's Lives

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—Fire this morning totally destroyed St. Jean Baptist School in Hull, and for a time imperilled the lives of 250 children. Eight children were injured through jumping from the windows, two of whom are in a serious condition. The property loss is estimated at \$10,000.
