## TREATMENT OF EPILEPSY.

Since the publication of my last papers upon this subject, I am leased to find that the use of strychnia in the treatment of Epilepsy has been taken up with success by many of the profession, both in this country and in the colonics.

In seeking to care a disease like epilopsy we must took further than the mere stoppage of the attacks; we must produce some positive alteration in the nervous condition of our patient; we must detect and strengthen that weak spot in the nervous system that allows of the involuntary discharge of nervous power; for it is evidently thus that epilopsy arises. Irritation alone will not produce epilepsy. There must exist a predisposition, a a hypersonsitive condition of the nervous system, coupled with a want of power of control; for we see that similar causes of irritation may exist in a number of persons, but in only a very small percentage of these will epilopsy supervene, and in those few a deficient power of control of the nervous system is evidenced by the large number of edult
