OROCERIES AND PROVISIONS.

The following are the receipts of California butter from San Francisco, by ss. Umatilla, March 6, for Victoria : 5 cs, 515 lbs; 22 half cs 1,250 lbs; Total 1,795 lbs. Receipts Feb., 27, 2,1751bs; Feb., 20, 2,705 lbs. The Refinery prices for sugar continues the same as for some time past. The sugar situation is a peculiar one. The price of raw sugars advanced recently, sufficient to cause an advance of Ac in refinery quotations, but it appears that the refinery does not intend to advance their selling price, owing to the presence of a consignment of China refined in this city, which is offered to the trade at 54c-4c per 1b less ohan the jobbers offer Vancouver Refinery sugar. As soon as the China sugar is off the market the refinery will no doubt advance their list prices in sympathy with the present price of raws in the eastern market.

American canned meats, staples, are quoted to the jobbers in bond as follows. Roast corned and lunch beef, I's per doz., \$1.30; do. 2's per doz., \$2.10; lunch tongues, 1's per doz.\$3.35; do. 2's, \$5.90. Armour's white label conserved soups in 2 lb. tins are quoted at \$3 per doz.

Commission agents quote American meats f. o. b. Victoria, duty paid as follows: Medium hams, 171c per lb; heavy hams, 17c; choice breakfast bacon, 18c; short clear sides, 14c, and dry salt clear sides, 14c. Armour's white label pure lard, 10lb. pails, 193c per lb.

Armour's Gold Band meats, are the finest quality on the Amerimarket, being a special grade for choice family trade, are quoted, (duty paid, Victoria), hams, 19c, breakfast

bacon, 193c. The British Columbia Sugar Refining Co. L'td., quote as follows in their weekly price list: Powdered icing and bar, 63c; Paris lumps, 64c; granulated 54c; extra C. 5c; fancy yellow, 4gc; yellow 4ge; golden C., 4gc. Sales have been made during the past week of creamery in round lots at 227e to 23e for the Toronto market, and Ne undland buyers have taken several lots of Western at 20c. A good jobbing business is being done at within range of our quotations. which are as follows: Creamery choice late made, 22c to 23c; Creamery good to fine, 21c to 22c. About 1c to 2c may be added to above prices for choice selections of single tubs. The demand for rolls continues good, Western having sold all the way from 19c to 21c, and Morrisburg at 201c to 22c. A lot of 5 tubs of very fine Western was sold at 201c. The cheese market remains firm-that is, what there is left of it; and, as we stated last week, the season is about over, there being no stock here of any consequence for sale. Last sales were made at 111c for choice white, and colored is quoted at 11ge to 11de. It will not be long before some of the Western factories will have their fodder goods on the market, especially as prices are likely to invite an early make. There will undoubtedly be a heavy make during the coming summer and fall, as farmers have had everything to encourage them during the past season to increase their production."

Stocks are ample and prices generally continue steady. Oilcake meal is reported as having advanced considerably in San Francisco, and is quoted at \$12 a ton there, while local firms continue to quote at \$40 in Victoria.

The Portland Commercial Review says of flour: "In spite of some difficulty in securing milling wheat within the range of current values, the manufactured article is weak and cheaper to self. Outside of local requirements, British Columbia and China constitute the principal outlet for surplus stock and as the movement in the direction of these

competition to place stock has resulted in a 10c decline all round. Local stocks are somewhat in excess of the wants of this community, and while San Francisco is taking fair quantities and moderate shipments are going north and to China the curtailment of exports by sail to Europe is seriously felt, cutting off an important revenue for our surplus stock. The mills throughout Oregon and Washington are not being worked to their capacity, partly owing to the lack of profitable markets and also to relative dearness of wheat. Yet even working as closely as possible as to the output, the endeavor to keep mills from shutting down brings more stock here than can be disposed of profitably. Portland and Salem roller brands have been reduced to \$3.30 per bbl., while other interior standards are held at \$3.40 to \$3.50 nominally, but actual business appears to be done on or about equal prices. Dayton and Cascadia are quoted at \$3.40, Graham at \$3, and Albina Superfine at \$2.50. Rail receipts for past week were 1,000 bb :. of Valley flour and 3,960 bbls. from east of the mountains. Over 2,500 hundred bbls. went to San Francisco by steamer, mostly. Walla Walla stock."
