The mean temperature of September the 28th was probably higher than that of any other day this year. Even in the heat of summer the thermometer generally drops below sixty during the night or just before sunrise; but on this day the minimum was 62 and the maximum 84, which gives, for the 24 hours; a mean temperature of 73 degrees. The temperature of the following day, Michaelmas, was still higher, the minimum being 64, the maximum 87, and the mean 751.
