THE CHURCHMAN'S FRIEND is intended to supply a want which, we believe, every Canadian Clergyman must have often and painfully experienced. We are not only surprised that in a land where the number of their ministers of the Church is so disproportionate to the population and extent of the country, there should be a lamentable degree of ignorance respecting the history of the Church, Her Doctrines, and Her Ordinances.
