Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): That is the purpose of the operation that is taking place now, but I will have occasion in the next three or four days to see for myself. I will make a more specific answer when I return.

Mr. Woolliams: I wonder whether, when the minister makes the trip and the investigation, he will assure the house that we have not lost any of our markets, particularly the Japanese market.

B.C. SALMON—ACTION TO RESTORE STABILITY TO INDUSTRY

Mr. Lloyd R. Crouse (South Shore): Mr. Speaker, I should like to direct this question to the Minister of Fisheries. In view of the crisis in the British Columbia salmon fishing industry and the imminent closure of coastal salmon packing operations affecting the livelihood of over 600 workers will the minister say what action is planned by the government to restore some stability to the industry in which two pioneer firms have been driven out of business?

Mr. Speaker: The hon. member is asking the question in a very general way. He is asking the minister to make a statement of policy. I doubt whether the question as asked is in order.

Mr. Crouse: I would like to ask what action the government is taking in this regard.

Hon. Jack Davis (Minister of Fisheries): I should like to make clear that the salmon fishing industry on the west coast, over all, is in good shape. However, some areas are in difficulties. We have been holding discussions recently with the Indian people who live in those areas.

Mr. Crouse: Mr. Speaker, I have a supplementary question which I should like to direct to the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. Arising from the meetings held in Terrace, British Columbia, by the minister, and the representations made to him by Indian workers affected by the lay-offs at the packing plant, and by the 3,000 29180-316

people in those families, will the minister say whether he is making any recommendations to the government to accelerate its economic development program for Indians in that area.

Hon. Jean Chrétien (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): Mr. Speaker, on my return from Terrace I immediately got in touch with the Minister of Fisheries. We discussed that problem and we are trying to find a solution for those 300 Indians who may suffer from the after-effects of automation. We are also considering schemes that would enable us to promote other economic activities in the area.
