Questions CYPRUS—COST OF MAINTAINING CANADIAN TROOPS

Question No. 780-Mr. Thomas (Middlesex West):

1. What is the average cost per day of maintaining Canadian troops on the island of Cyprus? 2. How many days were Canadian troops stationed on Cyprus prior to December 1, 1967?

Hon. Léo Cadieux (Minister of National Defence): 1 and 2. From 27 March 1964 to 31 December 1967, a period of 1,375 days, the total out of pocket expenses absorbed by Canada over and above the costs which would normally be required to maintain these forces in Canada, is estimated at \$11,559,000. This includes the initial positioning of the troops in Cyprus and subsequent rotation costs. Costs have varied, as the number of troops have been reduced and Canada has asked the United Nations to assume more of the out of pocket costs associated with maintaining the Canadian contingent in Cyprus. Although one could divide the out of pocket estimated costs by the number of days in Cyprus to arrive at an average cost per day, it would not provide a true picture.

BILINGUAL BONUS TO PUBLIC SERVICE EMPLOYEES

Question No. 784-Mr. Caouette:

1. How many public service employees receive the 7 per cent bonus paid to bilingual employees, and how many in each department?

2. Under what conditions is the bonus granted?

Hon. Judy V. LaMarsh (Secretary of State): I have been given the following information by the Public Service Commission: 1. The attached list indicates the number of employees under the Public Service Employment Act, in each department, who receive the 7 per cent bonus. (There are other public service employees who receive this bonus, but they do not come under the jurisdiction of this act.)

2. The bonus is granted to employees in respect of positions in the secretarial, stenographic and typing group in which adequate performance of duties and/or effective service to the public requires the use of both official languages, who are actually using a second official language at least 10 per cent of their time in the performance of their duties, and who are qualified by the Public Service Commission as meeting an appropriate standard of competence in the two official languages. The responsibility for certifying that the required conditions have been met rests with the deputy head.
