(b) Military equipment sales have included applied research and development, pre-production, production, licence agreements and technical assistance, installation (other than construction) and repair, overhaul and modification. "Off the Shelf" general procurement, construction, fuels and lubricants, basic raw materials and services (such as rentals and transportation) are excluded. Military equipment sold by Canada has been, for the most part, items having a high technological content and includes such items as aircraft, aircraft engines and spares, air-frame and engine components and spares, flight simulators, reconnaissance drones and spares, navigation and communication equipment and spares, avionics, marine valves, sonar equipment, ammunition and components, and vehicle parts and spares.

FATTAH REPORT

Question No. 3,154—Mr. Reynolds:

Has the Solicitor General received a copy of the report from Mr. Ezzat Abdel Fattah on public attitudes towards capital punishment in Canada, and (a) if not, on what date does he expect to receive the report (b) if so, will the report be made public or available to Members of the House of Commons?

Hon. Warren Allmand (Solicitor General): Yes. A preliminary copy of the report by Ezzat A. Fattah, Phd., entitled "The Canadian Public and the Death Penalty: a Study of a Social Attitude" was received in March, 1975. The final report was received on October 3, 1975. (a) Not applicable. (b) Publication of the report is now under consideration.

AIR COMMAND HEADQUARTERS BUDGET

Question No. 3,290—Mr. Howie:

What amount of money was budgeted for salaries for the first year of operation of Air Command Headquarters at Winnipeg?

Hon. James Richardson (Minister of National Defence): The money budgeted for salaries for the first year of operation of Air Command September 1, 1975 to August 31, 1976 is as follows: Military Personnel, \$6,286,538; Civilian Personnel, \$507,095; Total: \$7,793,633.

HMCS "PROVIDER"

Question No. 3,313—Mr. McKinnon:

1. Is it the government's intention to refit HMCS *Provider* in the near future?
2. Is the refit to be done at the refit facilities in Halifax and, if not (a) for what reason (b) in what location will it be done?

Hon. James Richardson (Minister of National Defence): 1. Yes. Present intentions are for the refit to commence in the fall of 1976.

2. No. (a) and (b). It is intended to refit the *Provider* under contract on the west coast as the ship is based there. A contract refit is planned because the scheduled maintenance requirements for other vessels will fully load HMC Esquimalt dockyard facilities.

MILITARY AND CIVILIAN STRENGTH OF DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL DEFENCE

Question No. 3,328—Mr. McKinnon:

What was the (a) military (b) civilian strength of the Department of National Defence and Armed Forces on March 31, 1974 and March 31, 1975?

Hon. James Richardson (Minister of National Defence): March 31, 1974, Military Strength, 80,563; Civilian Strength, 38,886; March 31, 1975, Military Strength, 78,323; Civilian Strength, 35,050.
