

made some few corrections, which escaped his notice in preparing for the press the second English Edition. He trusts that with these alterations, it will be found a useful help to the Clergy and Catechists in feeding the lambs of CHRIST's flock with the pure milk of the word, and leading them in the pastures of salvation.

He thinks it proper to add a brief account of the plan of catechising which he pursued in his own church, for a course of ten years, taken from the Preface to the Second Edition, in which it was inserted at the request of a Prelate of the Church of England.

First, then, he has endeavoured to make such an approach as his circumstances permitted to the plan so well propounded in Archdeacon Bather's *Charge*, referred to in the Introduction, of questioning instruction, upon some one point in the Catechism, *into* the children's minds in *school*, and questioning it *out* of them again in *church*. But as he has had only a *Sunday* school under his control, and that composed of children seldom above twelve years of age, he has been obliged to teach the greater part of the answers to his questions exactly in the way in which *viva voce* instruction is conveyed to classes in national schools, *i. e.* by class repetition.
