Great Base Stealing Record by F. Maisel

One of the most remarkable records for speed ever turned out in the official averages is that credited to "Frits" Maisel, third baseman of the Yanks, who went up from Baltimore of the International League. In 1913, according to official American League averages, Maisel stole 74 bases, and leads the league by a wide margin. "Frits" batting average of .239 didn't give him the opportunity to become a "big league" player, but the Athletics' speed was able to offset only 55 steals in his chase to head off the Yankees' flash.

The Athletics led in club batting with 272, and the Tigers were second with 253. The Yankees and a team batting average of .229, "tut" percentage points to the Athletics. "Frits" has been there or thereabouts in the official rating of the batting average. In 1913, when he played for the Athletics, he was in an emergency batting role for the team. In every other season Cobb has had a clear lead for the honor position among American League batmen. In 1911 and 1912 he led with averages of .420 and .410 respectively.

Cobb played in eighty-seven games during the 1914 season and was 24 percentage points above "Frits" Collins of the Athletics. "Frits" Collins, "Frits" Speaker and "Joe" Judge were a splendid race, the Athletics' second baseman finishing with 344 and the Red Sox and Nap outfielders being tied with 338.

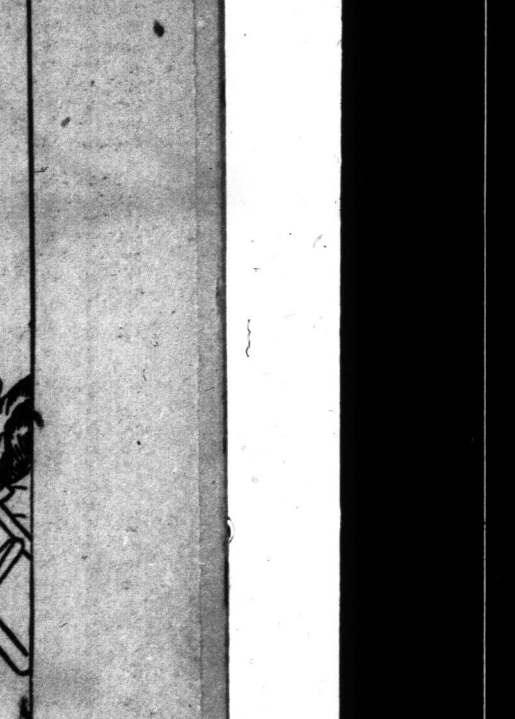
