OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—(Can. Press.)—Premier Borden's first day "at home" was a notable one in every respect. Afterwards he made a short address at the directors' luncheon, at which Sir Wilfrid Laurier was also in attendance, and then adjourning to the lawn in front of the directors' building, had his photograph taken in company with Sir Wilfrid, the two statesmen standing on either side of a President Bate of the Exhibition Association, and in the centre of a group of cabinet ministers.
