OFF TO THE KLONDIKE. Some Two Hundred Passengers Go by Another Steamer.

THEY WILL TAKE THE OVERLAND ROUTE. Seattle, Wash., July 28.—The steamer City of Topeka sailed today from Seattle with 210 passengers. She goes only as far as Juneau, where a majority of the passengers will branch out for the mines. The steamer Islander will sail from Victoria for Juneau with over 200 passengers. Nearly all those going on the Islander are from Seattle. The next vessel sailing from Seattle for Juneau will be the steamer Rosalie, chartered last Saturday for two trips. Already 150 passengers allowed by the inspectors have been booked for the Rosalie, and twenty more are hanging anxiously about the office, awaiting the chance of someone dropping out at the last moment.
