Napanee Bank Robbery Trial Goes Over to the Assizes According to Present Appearances—The Evidence Yesterday Was Slight—An Argument By the Lawyers.

Napanee, Aug. 12.—(Special.)—To-day a resting-point was reached in this case. Uncertainty has been dispelled by Magistrate Daly's decision not to try the case. The Crown has closed its fight, while the defence will have a chance to show its hand on Tuesday.

The defence lawyers claim to be satisfied with the present state of things. Mr. Porter, speaking to The World, said there had been no evidence produced implicating his client, W. H. Ponton. "I can't conceive of his being sent up."

Extremely Hot Weather Has Not Agreed With His Holiness—Speculation As To a Successor to the Pontifical Throne—Cardinal Parocchi is One Candidate and His Rival is Cardinal Vannutelli.

New York, Aug. 12.—The Journal prints the following special cable despatch from Rome: The Osservatore Romano, the organ of the Vatican, announces that the Pope was stricken with an illness to-day caused by the extreme hot weather. Dr. Lapponi orders absolute rest. All audiences are suspended.

The news has caused a great sensation, as it is the first official announcement of the illness of the Pope.

No sovereign of the Old World has manifested a greater degree of sensitiveness with regard to announcements about his health, and the news therefore that is contained in The Osservatore Romano, the official organ of the Papacy, to the effect that he is ill, is far more serious than appears on the surface, for it constitutes the first admission that has ever been made officially that the Pope is ill.

In fact, if his consciousness were not unduly far gone to render him unable to learn the news of the day and to peruse the daily papers, of which he is a most constant reader, nothing about his health would assuredly have been published.

His Probable Successor. For a long time past, in fact ever since the beginning of the present summer, when it first became apparent that his reign was drawing to a close, discussion has been busy with the choice of his successor.

There are at the present moment two cardinals who are papable; that is to say, likely candidates for the tiara. They are Cardinal Parocchi and Cardinal Vannutelli. Cardinal Parocchi is the distinct opponent of the policy so long pursued by Leo XIII. in the endeavor to bring about a modus vivendi with the Italian government. If he becomes Pope he will be the knife with King Humbert, and at the same time he may be relied upon to transform the attitude of the Vatican towards Don Carlos and change his cause into a much more friendly one.

He is a man of very strong character, a stern disciplinarian and is strongly opposed to what he does not hesitate to describe as the coquetting of Leo XIII. with the so-called liberal and advanced faction of the church.

In one word, he has for the last three years been the leader in the Sacred College, the Senate of the Papacy. He is able to count upon all of the Italian Cardinals, who constitute one-half of the Sacred College, and likewise upon the German Cardinals, so that his majority seems to be assured.
