Five thousand strikers held a meeting to-day and voted to reject with contempt the proposals made by the owners yesterday, which were pronounced insulting. The meeting demanded that the government should no longer send sailors of the navy to man the steamers, and declared that the strikers would not answer for order if the liberty to strike was not respected. The strikers adjourned, cheering for a general strike. The meeting was resumed this evening, and the strikers voted to persist in the strike until they had obtained entire satisfaction. Three steamers left the port to-day with mails, passengers and freight. The weather has become very cold here, and there was a heavy fall of snow this morning.
