

Live Wire Kills Bridge Works Em: ploye - Alleged Jamborees at Hospital.

Hamilton, Aug. 18 .- (Special.) - Jas. Herman Fowler of Smith's Falls was lectrocuted this afternoon at the Hamilton Bridge Works at 4.30. He was at work on the inside near the top of the building when he touched a live wire carrying 2200 volts. He was killed instantly and his body thrown to the roof. It fell across three wires stretched along the building 40 feet from the floor and was suspended there until the current was turned off. The dead man was a painter and boarded at 222 North Hughson-street. He had been standing on a transformer platform, but climbed up higher to do some painting. Some part of his body came in contact with a live wire that was not insulated and which ran along was not insulated and which ran along an iron girder. Fowler was 22 years of age and unmarried. He helped to support his mother, a widow, who lives at Smith's Falls. This was his last week at the bridge works, as he had made all arrangements to go to Winnipeg Saturday. He belonged to the 91st Highlanders and to the painters' union. The body was taken to the private morgue of Latchford and Son after Coroner Balfe had been notified.
