At the start the Spaniards scattered, but afterward made an effort to rally their forces. They only succeeded in being able to retreat in regular order to the village of Palma.

After six hours' hard fighting at Palma the Spaniards raised a flag of truce and expressed themselves as be-

WILLING TO SURRENDER. Terms were speedily arranged, and the Cubans took as prisoners one Spanish colonel, seven captains, several other officers, besides 103 soldiers. Spanish loss amounted to 76 dead, besides a large number who were wounded. Included in the Spanish losses

were thirteen officers. The Cubans sustained a heavy loss, but it was considerably smaller than that of the Spaniards. It is reported that there were 45 killed, including five officers of lesser rank, and about

60 wounded. After the battle, the Cubans returned to Jiguani. There they recovered a large quantity of arms and ammunition from the deserted Spanish camp, together with provisions and supply wagons, which the enemy had been compelled to leave behind.
