WILL DIG UP BERGERAC
 Parisians After Tomb of Long-Nosed Cyran
 Paris, Aug. 10.—It has been decided to search for the remains of Cyran de Bergerac, the famous poet. The decision has been taken by the Commission of Ancient Paris, and the remains are to be sought for in the soil on which formerly stood the church of the convent of the Dominicans de la Croix in the Rue Chanoine, where it is known that the hero of Edmond Rostand's great drama was buried.
 The convent was erected in 1641 by Charlotte Marie Ruzé d'Effiat, the sister of Cinq-Mars, and the last vestiges of it were removed about a year ago in consequence of the law abolishing religious communities.
 Savinien de Cyran de Bergerac, who was born in Paris in 1613, died at the house of his brother, Abel de Cyran, near Melun, in 1655. His body was brought back to the capital and interred in the convent of the Dames de la Croix by his aunt, Katherine de Cyran, who was a nun known as the Rev. Mother Marguerite de Jesus, of

SMELLS OUT LUNATICS
 London Doctor Says Crazy Men Emit Strong Odor.
 London, Aug. 12. — A leading physician, Dr. Harabayashi, has just revealed an interesting discovery made by him regarding lunatics. He asserts that lunatics emit a noxious odor which is peculiar to themselves. This odor, although it comes from the waste products of the body, does not exist in sane beings, and Dr. Harabayashi thinks it is either due to the curious change in the perspiration which issues from the pores or to the presence of certain acids which exist in greater quantities in the bodies of lunatics.
 The physician says he once knew a young man, aged 31 years, who had lost his reason two years previously. This patient was particularly clean, and insisted on having his bath daily, but would never bathe with others. Yet the water in which he bathed had a most offensive odor. As the man recovered this smell left him, and when he was discharged from the asylum he emitted no odor whatever.
 The doctor says that the gravity of a case of insanity can be tested by the intensity of the smell emitted by the lunatic.
