Judging from these newspaper reports, the situation is regarded as desperate. Neutrality, which time and again has been recognized by previous belligerents, no longer suffices, and with the entry of the United States into the war hostilities, the Politiken says, operated against the unfortunate small states. The paper says America seems to lack the most elementary appreciation of Denmark's difficulties. It says that articles from influential American papers indicate that the United States intends to force Denmark either to join Germany and starve, or join the Entente and share the fate of Belgium.
