MORE TROUBLE ON UNIVERSITY

Archbishop Walsh Denounces Proposed Compromise.

VISIT A FAMOUS MOUNTAIN

Many Irish Folk from Over Seas in This Year's Pilgrimage Up Croagh Patrick.

Dublin, Aug. 21. — The government and administration of Trinity College, Dublin, as a university school for all Ireland is exciting renewed controversy. There appears to be little hope that the royal commission, which is to inquire into the subject in October next, can do much that will satisfy the advocates of a totally distinct university for the Roman Catholic youth of Ireland. A certain section of Catholic laymen, it is true, think that Trinity can be remodeled so as to make it acceptable to all, but Archbishop Walsh, of Dublin, is quite of the opposite opinion.

Interviewed on the proposals of these Catholic laymen, the archbishop said: "The project is a senseless one. No government could think of proposing to parliament a bill embodying such a scheme. There is to be a Catholic chapel in the college, as well as a Protestant one. Then there is to be a faculty of theology, and all this not merely in the same university, but in the same college. The ingenious theorists who have evolved all this out of their inner consciousness have evidently left out of account not only the Irish Catholic bishops, but the holy see. These people have, perhaps, some confused idea of the double faculties of theology in some of the universities of Germany. Such a scheme will not do for Ireland."

A few years ago, when the archbishop of Tuam suggested an annual revival of the ancient pilgrimage to the summit of Croagh Patrick, the lofty mountain in Mayo where St. Patrick prayed for the welfare of the Irish nation, the idea was enthusiastically taken up throughout the country, but it was not then thought that it would appeal to Irish men and women outside Ireland.

The pilgrimage this year, however, has furnished one of the most remarkable scenes in the history of the country, for, not only was every province of Ireland represented, but many men and women were present from the United States, as well as from the British colonies. Withered, worn and poverty-stricken many of the throng of pilgrims looked, but they were determined to pray in the little chapel built on the summit of the mountain.

While the Irish people generally are pleased with the action of the Government in relation to the Transvaal problem and the methods proposed to solve it, there is a feeling of disgust among the advanced section of nationalists that Campbell-Bannerman and his cabinet have not seen their way to grapple with the Irish problem in the same vigorous manner. Even such a moderate as T. W. Russell, M.P., until quite recently was one of the most uncompromising pillars of the unionist party in Ireland, is now prepared to draw a parallel between Ireland and the Transvaal.

"So far as the central facts are concerned," he says, "they constitute a most perfect replica of Ireland. Everywhere except in Witwatersrand district the British are in a majority—in short, the Transvaal corresponds exactly with our northeastern corner of Ulster. These Ulster loyalists, if not the landlords themselves, are the slaves of landlords and plutocrats, and when they talk of British supremacy they are merely thinking of the supremacy of their own class and their right to 'run' Ireland for their own interests and for their own aggrandizement. Such a condition of things cannot be tolerated much longer."

With the rising of parliament a number of the Irish members will be returning to their homes, and they must be delighted with the prospect of being able to spend a month or two in the bosom of their families. The great majority of the Irish members are married men, whose homes are in the maintenance of two establishments, so that a large proportion of them are obliged to live in obscure lodgings in London during the parliamentary session.

"Those who talk about the glory of so-called parliamentary honors," says Conner O'Kelly, M.P., "have little idea of what they are talking about. They ought to try to live in London for nine out of the twelve months of the year on the unsettled income of an Irish M.P., and perhaps they might realize that there is an element of hardship in the 'glory.' Until members of parliament are paid in England as they are in Canada and in other countries the lot of the poor man in parliament will not be a happy one."

"Andrew Carnegie's libraries, though always a medium of intellectual recreation, are also at times a source of violent discussion and personal recrimination. The Carnegie library committee at Cork does not appear to be quite unanimous on questions of administration. A few days ago it was proposed to appoint an assistant in the library. The advertisement stipulated that he must be a speaker of Gaelic. Councillor Sisk opposed the motion on the grounds that there was no vacancy and if the appointment was made one of the present assistants must be discharged. In the course of a vigorous speech he described the Gaelic league as 'the finest movement in the world,' but declared it was 'in the hands of the rottenest set of men.' This was more than the rebel city could stand, so it is not surprising that pandemonium followed."

FOREMOST IN ALL WALKS OF LIFE

Are the Canadians Domiciled in the United States.

CONGRESS, COMMERCE, COLLEGE

Several United States Bishops Were Born North of the Line—James J. Hill a Canadian by Birth.

[From the New York Post.]
Announcement by James J. Hill of his intention to add another to the transatlantic cable line between Canada has resulted during the last few months in drawing attention once more to the large number of American farmers and others who have crossed and are crossing from the Northwestern States of the Union to take up farms in Manitoba, Alberta, and Saskatchewan.

While it is true that a large number of Americans have settled in the western provinces of the Dominion within the last half-dozen years, the loss to the United States is small when compared with the steady exodus from Canada to this country which has continued for nearly half a century.

S. Morley Wickett, writing in the current issue of the Political Science Quarterly, asserts that the growing percentage of these expatriated Canadians has been paralleled by the Scandinavians alone. Between 1850 and 1900 the foreign-born in Canada fell slightly from 28 to 25.8 per cent; of Irish, from 42.8 to 15.6 per cent; of British, from 16.8 to 11.3 per cent; but the percentage of Scandinavians jumped from .9 to 10.3 per cent, and that of Canadians from 6.06 to 11.04 per cent. The relative increase of Canadian settlers between 1890 and 1900, is marked, as the following table shows:

Not only the older residents of the United States cause to complain of the influx, for Canada has given to this country leaders in every line of endeavor. Mr. Hill himself was born and spent most of his boyhood in the Dominion, and he is only one of several leading railroad men of whom this may be said. United States representatives in congress, mayors of large cities, heads of important universities, bishops and other prominent clergymen, physicians so prominent that the vacancy at Johns Hopkins caused by the departure of Dr. Osler was filled by another of his countrymen—all of the professions, not forgetting the stage, show Canadians well at the top in the United States.

It may be mentioned, in passing, that to offset the loss to Canada of James J. Hill, the Dominion has drawn freely on the United States for heads of her big railroads. Sir William Van Horne, chairman of the board of directors of the Canadian Pacific, and Sir Thomas G. Shaughnessy, the president, were both born in the United States of American parents and learned the rudiments of railroading on this side of the line. Mr. Hays, vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk; F. H. McGuigan, the fourth vice-president, and others filling important positions with the older system are old Wabash men, most of whom retain their American citizenship.

But Canada has given others besides James J. Hill in exchange. David Spencer Wegg, of Chicago, formerly president of the Northern Pacific and counsel for several of the large companies, was born and received his schooling in St. Thomas, Ont.; Percy R. Todd, first vice-president of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, and traffic manager for several years of the West Shore Railroad, owns Canada as his birthplace, and from London, Ont., comes Nicholas Monsarrat, president of the Hocking Valley Railroad.

A Canadian who has been much in the eyes of the New York public in recent years is Dr. E. R. L. Gould, ex-city chamberlain, banker, and philanthropist. He was born in Oshawa, Ont., and held positions at Johns Hopkins and the University of Chicago before engaging in business.

THE UNIVERSITY ROLL.
To mention the name of a Canadian who has held office in an American university is to begin a roll of names familiar to all who are interested in educational matters. At the head of the list is Jacob Gould Schurman, president of Cornell, born on Prince Edward Island, educated in Nova Scotia, and for six years a professor in the colleges of that province before he was called to the chair of philosophy at Cornell, which he filled for the six years which intervened before his elevation to the presidency. In a recent article on the prominence of Canadians in American university faculties, the Toronto Globe said:

"In the west at least four or five college presidencies are in Canadian hands. At the head of the State University of Idaho we find a brilliant graduate of Toronto, James A. MacLean, born at Mayfair, 38 years ago. After a post-graduate course in Columbia University Dr. MacLean filled the chair of political science in Colorado until he was promoted to the position in 1900. Dr. George Bridgman, a graduate of Victoria, presides over Hamilton, the Methodist university of Minnesota. Another prominent institution of the same denomination, Wesleyan University, in North Dakota, has as its Canadian, Dr. Thomas Nicholson, at its head. Michigan contributes to the roll of honor President Samuel Dickie, of Albion College, the well-known prohibition leader.

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economist and historian, and Professor Schofield, of the English department, and as director of the extension teaching of the university since 1903; Frederick H. Sykes, who was well-known in Ontario as a teacher and editor of educational publications before he went south ten years ago to engage in university extension work and earn the reputation of being the most popular lecturer in that wide field; Columbia, George Rice Carpenter in English, and Frederick Woodbridge in philosophy; Johns Hopkins, among other Northerners, has in its Latin department a Queen's graduate, Harry Langford Wilson.

ONE SENATOR, FOUR REPRESENTATIVES.

One United States senator and four Representatives in Congress—all, by the way, ardent Republicans—were born in the Dominion. They are United States Senator Gallagher of New Hampshire, whose birthplace is Cornsall, Ont.; Representative Philip Pitt Campbell of the third Kansas district, born in Nova Scotia; Duncan B. McKinley of the second California district, a native of Orillia, Ont.; James Anthony Hughes of the fifth district of West Virginia, whose birthplace was Cornsall, Ont.; and James Thompson McCleary of the second district of Minnesota, who was born at Ingersoll, Ont.

Others prominent in official circles at Washington, who were born across the border are Herbert G. Soule, ex-minister to Cuba, and Edward C. Madden, third assistant postmaster-general. According to Douglas Hall, the author of the article in the Toronto Globe to which reference has been made, "bishops seem to be the dominion's long suit." He says:

Archbishop Guile of Chicago was born at Oshawa, though most of his early years were spent in the United States. Patrick William Riordan, who for over twenty years has been archbishop of San Francisco, is a New Brunswicker. The Protestant Episcopal Church numbers among its leaders Bishop Niles of New Hampshire, born across the line in Quebec; Arthur Llewellyn Williams, bishop coadjutor of the Episcopal diocese of Buffalo and C. P. Anderson of Chicago, a Trinity graduate, Alaska and the Philippines are, each, both under the pastoral care of Canadian bishops—Dr. Rowe and Dr. Brent. In the Methodist Episcopal Church is Bishop Berry of Buffalo and Bishop Fowler, a Burford man, national, but cosmopolitan, presiding over Northwestern University for four years, then in China, organizing Peking and Nankin Universities, and again at St. Petersburg, founding the first Methodist Church in that city; or of Edmund M. Mills, whose

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great administrative powers were shown in his successful management of the twentieth century thank-offering fund, which raised \$2,000,000 for church purposes.

When the distinguished surgeon, Dr. Osler, was called to Oxford his successor was Dr. Llewellyn Franklin Barker, a graduate of Toronto University. It has been estimated that there are between four and five thousand Canadian students in the medical lists of the United States.

Canadians are also well represented on the stage, among the writers and in the legal and journalistic professions. On the New York, Boston and Chicago newspapers are a large number of sons of the Dominion, and every year brings new recruits.
