Both have come through a period of rapid growth, during which they have been receiving everything with very little effort on their part. But on the day of their graduation they are thrown upon their own resources, and must show the stuff of which they are made. Women entering the political field are much in the same position. Everything in the way of legislation has hitherto been carried out for them, but now they are to be thrown upon their own resources, and it is theirs to prove that they are ready for the responsibility.

In a short time it undergoes a chemical change, and acts as "mother" in turning the cider to vinegar.
