In all other cases of failure, appeals will not be refused if submitted at once, accompanied by a fee of \$2.

Certificates and statements of the marks obtained by unsuccessful candidates are being sent out to the principals, to whom all candidates are referred for further information.

Successful candidates who desire to attend the coming session of either faculty of education, should make application to the dean of the faculty of the university concerned, from whom forms of application and all necessary information may be obtained.
