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### "PROGRESSORS" ARE VETERANS WHO ASK THAT LOCAL OFFICE REMAIN IN OPERATION

Famous Unit is Ordered West  
Royal Canadians Are Coming Here.

London will shortly accommodate the headquarters and two companies of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The regulars will come to the city early in September and take the place of the local constabulary. The four companies, one in Toronto and two in London, will be stationed at the city early in September.

The R. C. M. P. men are now in Montreal, and will be coming to London. One is to be stationed at Hallifax, one in Toronto and two in London. Prior to the war, the Company of the R. C. M. P. was stationed at Wolsey Barracks. The regiment had eight companies, but the proposal to close the local branch on September 1 is likely to cause considerable inconvenience to returned men who have been depending on the local branch for aid in securing farms.

According to notice received at the local office, the proposal to close the local branch has been in operation for nearly two years, and in that time has done good work in securing farms for returned men. It has placed over 2,000 men on farms, and the majority of them are doing well. The local branch was the secretary of the G. W. V. A. and will use the facilities of the G. W. V. A. in taking action against the proposal to close the local branch.

**LOCAL BOARDS MAY BE APPOINTED TO ADJUST PENSIONS**

Eighty-Nine Special Bodies May Be Selected in Province.

Toronto, Aug. 18.—The mothers' pension commission today considered the appointment of local boards in cities, separated towns, districts and counties. It is thought that these bodies may number 89 in the province, and it was decided that they should consist of five members, two to be appointed by the mayor or warden and three by the commission.

The question was mooted of having three boards for Toronto and Hamilton, but nothing definite was arrived at on this point. As to the duties of the local boards, there was no discussion as to whether they should do any investigating or whether that should be left entirely to the pension service. There was a difference of opinion as to whether the commission should expect local boards to go on investigating and making recommendations for allowances have been received from 12 to 18 hours on a single trip.
