## FREE HAND FOR OIL

## DRILLERS IN FRANCE

Any One May Prospect, No Matter Who Is Owner of the Property.

PARIS, Nov. 9.—The discovery of oil deposits in Landes last week, followed by the finding of important oil tracings in Limagne this week, has resulted in calling the attention of foreign prospectors to the advantageous nature of the French laws covering mining, as any nation in the development of mineral wealth, provided the French Government receives its share of the profits when the exploitation company is formed and operating.

The basic provisions of these laws have not been changed in a hundred years, while free privileges were granted to prospectors and operating companies by amendments to these laws enacted last September. They provide that anyone, irrespective of nationality, may discover and operate any or any share in the minerals or oils obtained.

But while research work is open to all persons, concessions are granted only to French citizens, so that if American drillers now working in Southern France strike oil they will have to find a Frenchman to act as a figurehead in any corporation they may form to exploit their discoveries. Talks in the United States, these exploitation corporations are not permitted to own surface rights. The latest strike of oil by prospectors is reported from Clermont Ferrand, in the Department of Puy de Dome, where, according to reports, they have struck oil in great abundance at a depth of 1,500 feet.

## COMMONS ARRESTED

RESULT OF SPEECH

Col. Malone Held After Search of Apartment by Police.

DUBLIN, Nov. 10.—Lieut.-Col. L. E. Malone, Liberal member of the House of Commons, was arrested tonight by a staff officer inside Trinity College, where Colonel Malone had gone by invitation to speak in a debate on bolshevism at the Collectors' Society.

APARTMENT RAIDED.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The apartment in London of Lieut.-Col. Malone was raided by the police yesterday. A search of two hours was made by the policemen, who carried away large bundles of documents alleged to be of a revolutionary character.

Colonel Malone already had started for Dublin, and his arrest there tonight by him in Albert Hall, in London, Sunday, on the occasion of the anniversary of the Russian revolution. It is known that the speeches delivered then by Colonel Malone and others have been under consideration by crown law officers.

## STOCK-BREEDER AT

MONCTON OPPOSES

TARIFF REDUCTION

Wire Fence Firm Claims Protection Does Not Increase Price.

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 10.—A. Chapman, manager of a wire fence company, submitted before the tariff inquiry commission here today, a statement which declared that the protection enjoyed by his firm cost the consumer nothing, as his price for fencing was on a par with the price in the New England States.

A. E. Trites of Salisbury, president of the Maritime Stock Breeders' Association, on behalf of the farming interests, opposed tariff reduction, and G. Archibald of the United Farmers' Guild spoke briefly, regretting the unexpected absence of the Dominion Savings Bank Farmers' party, who, he felt, would not have taken Mr. Trite's attitude toward the tariff.

## BETTER ENFORCEMENT

OF TEMPERANCE ACT

PLANNED BY GOVT.

Premier Drury Hints at Important Announcement Very Shortly.

TORONTO, Nov. 10.—Premier Drury hinted today that the Government would have an important announcement ready in a day or two with reference to Government action in the better enforcement of the O. T. A. He declined, however, to answer any questions relative to the tragedy at Sandwich.

Hon. W. E. Ramey, attorney-general, and Chief Inspector Aynsford held a two-hour conference at the Parliament Buildings today, and at its conclusion the strictest secrecy was maintained as to the subjects under discussion.

The suggestion that a reorganization of the board of staff of officers enforcing the Ontario temperance act was in contemplation was neither denied nor affirmed, but Mr. Ramey, in commenting on the liquor situation, said: "We feel that there has been considerable improvement in the enforcement of the liquor law, but there is still much room for improvement. This is to be expected, when you realize that there are thousands of persons in a position to break the law who have to be watched."

May Increase Force.

Asked if the Government contemplated adding more officers to enforce the act along the border, Mr. Ramey said as many men would be put on the force as the Government advised the situation required. The Government would be guided in this respect by the advice of the force of men now doing the work. Beyond this statement, Mr. Ramey said he could not at present discuss the situation for publication.

The license board has a staff of only ten or twelve officers working along the border at Windsor.

## MEIGHEN REFUSES

## AID FOR IRRIGATION

WORK IN ALBERTA

Says Province Should Do It—Terms Class Prejudice Fatal.

MEDICINE HAT, Nov. 10.—Irrigation was no more a problem for the Federal Government, in respect to the actual construction and operation of irrigation systems, than was Ontario's hydro-electric a federal matter, said Hon. Arthur Meighen, in addressing the Alberta Irrigation Association at Medicine Hat citizens, who wanted to hear his views on suggestions that his Government should undertake large measures which are thought necessary to insure regular crops in the dry areas of Southern Alberta.

The prime minister declared that after the Federal Government had spent something more than one million and a half dollars on elaborate surveys of the irrigation projects, the responsibility for constructing and administering the works, reated with the local districts and the Provincial Government, on any arrangements they desired to make. The premier pointed out that the Federal Government had done much for the Western provinces which was not done for the East, in the administration of forest reserves and national parks and other respects.

Natural Resources.

"While the principle of natural resources being locally controlled is best," he said, "these resources in Canada have been administered for the benefit of the people of the provinces, and only to a small extent has the Dominion Government had any revenue from them."

Mr. Meighen declared that Alberta was not backward in agricultural expansion. There was bound to be in the western provinces, and in Alberta, in particular, so great an industrial advance that the centre of commercial gravity rapidly would move from the East to the West.

Large Expenditures.

Mr. Meighen expressed the opinion that agriculture always had and always would receive fair treatment from the Government, and that it was in power. He pointed out the large expenditures on soldiers' land settlement, the payment of railway rates, the extending canals and waterways and marine transportation, as it was of particular benefit to the agricultural population. The prime minister closed his remarks by saying that he regarded as "the most fatal and disastrous appeal that can be made by a public man."

## BRITISH EMBASSY AT

## WASHINGTON TO TAKE

UP REPRISAL THREAT

Message Received Said 'Three Englishmen Will Pay Penalty' For Every Irishman.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The British embassy announced today it had taken steps to call the attention of the United States state department to a message recently received by the British chief secretary for Ireland, dated New York, and threatening reprisals against Englishmen resident in the United States "if there are any more reprisals in Ireland on and after the fourteenth day of November."

The New York message was sent in the name of the Amalgamated Irish Societies of America, and bore the signature "J. V. O'Connor, president."

At the state department it was said nothing had been received from the embassy in relation to the message. No comment as to the course the Washington Government might pursue was available.

The New York message, as made public by the embassy, read: "We hereby inform and warn you that if there are any more reprisals in Ireland on and after the fourteenth day of November, 1920, that the men of Irish blood in this country and their sympathizers will immediately begin reprisals on Englishmen here who are not citizens of the United States; for every man, woman or child who is murdered after the above date by the cowardly English soldiers and police, three Englishmen in this country will pay the penalty."
