NOTE AND COMMENT

Only travelers and the residents themselves understand the wonderful increase in the population of the west the last few years, and games, as in business operations, are becoming as important as in the older portions of Canada, and, therefore, it is opportune that British Columbia becomes sufficiently alive to the fact to organize for the protection and fostering of sports and games.
