
Notable Figure in Presbyterian Churches Passes Away at Age of 82.

The Rev. William MacLaren, D.D., ex-principal of Knox College, died at 3 o'clock yesterday morning at the residence of his son, Rev. David Mac-Laren, 57 St. George-street, who with his daughter, Mrs. Mowat of Edmonwas with him when the end

The venerable clergyman, who had held the highest position in the gift of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was a few weeks ago arranging for a was a few weeks ago arranging for a sojourn at the seaside. Distinguished Career. The late ex-principal of Knox College had a distinguished career both as a minister of the Presbyterian Church and as an educationist. He was a native born Canadian, the town of Torbolton, Carleton County, claiming from as its most illustrious son. He was born on Jan. 26, 1828. His parents, David and Elizabeth MacLaren, were natives of Perthshire, Scotland. He

was the fifth son. At the Ottawa Grammar School and Toronto Academy, William MacLaren gave early promise of distinction in the sphere of learning, and availed himself of the opportunity to take a theo-logical and arts course. He was ordained to the Presbyterian Ministry in 1853, and inducted minister of the Pres-byterian Church at Amherstburg, Ont., where he remained for four years. The young preacher's fame had become


